

Breadth of achievement

Biologists, designers and classicists win honours

The British Biology Olympiad, for which schools were able to submit their best five biologists, attracted approximately 2000 sixth formers. It is particularly pleasing that two Bryanstonians should have won awards, Chris Taylor gaining gold and Nick Radford bronze. Chris's achievement placed him in the top 12 in the country and earned him a place in the final. Medals were presented at the Royal Institute of Surgery in London in July.



The Audi Designer of the Year Competition 2002 attracted entries from 600 A Level pupils across the country. Six Bryanstonians - Sue-Kim Bolton, Rachel Gotts, Jane Haslam, Ed Holtby, Chris Law and Jade Trott - were selected for the regional finals. Here they were required to demonstrate their design and technology projects and were interviewed by a panel of Audi designers. Ed Holtby won second prize in the Central area competition for his folding travel guitar which the judges deemed had market potential as well as being extremely well made.



Classical Orations competitions have long been a strength at Bryanston. In the Salisbury competition this year, Lou Broadbent won first prize in the Junior Greek class, Ali Hill won second prize in the Senior Latin class and Laura Gordon won second prize in Senior Greek class.

Science debate

During the Spring Term, the Science Society debated the motion "This house believes that the genetic modification of humans is morally wrong".

Over 100 pupils of all ages and a number of staff attended the lively debate. The motion was rejected by 90 votes to 12, with 23 abstentions.

Education for adventure

All first and second year pupils take part in an adventure education programme. The aim is to offer new experiences, provide personal challenges, both physical and mental, build confidence and commitment and develop the social skills of teamwork, communication and leadership. The 20 week course, which begins at the end of the first year, includes tree and rock climbing, caving, hiking, riding, rafting, archery and kayaking as well as problem solving exercises and instruction in map reading, expedition cooking and First Aid.

The programme culminates in five days at Skern Lodge Adventure Centre in Devon at the end of the

Spring Term. This year, 130 second year pupils took part in a series of challenges from coastal traversing, surfing and high ropes courses to more cerebral exercises involving logic, planning and teamwork. Despite the rather cool weather, all the pupils agreed they had benefited from the experience and had valued the opportunity to spend time together.





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Nepal expedition

Et Nova

Bryanston's 14th annual expedition to Nepal took place during the Easter holidays. Twenty-six pupils and five members of staff took part.

During their three weeks in Nepal, the group spent five days in Kathmandu visiting many beautiful



temples and historic buildings as well as riding in rickshaws, bartering with shopkeepers or simply watching the general hurly-burly of life in this vibrant city.





They also had a day white water rafting on the Trisuli River and two days in the Royal Chitwan Park.

However, for most the twelve days of trekking in the Annurpurna region of the Himalayas was the highlight of the expedition. Here life is simple, the air is fresh and the scenery breathtaking. The trek passed through rice paddies and rhododendron forest, along ridges and river valleys, through villages large and small, and from many points the mountain views were breathtaking. But apart from the exquisite beauty of this country one of the enduring memories for many is the extraordinary generosity and goodwill of a people who have so little and whose lives have been particularly difficult in recent times. The party returned to Bryanston with renewed determination to continue to support the work of charities in Nepal.

Vive la France

French was the only language spoken by the sixth form pupils who took part in the 'journée francophone et francophile" in the Spring Term. Split into three groups, the pupils undertook tasks including writing copy for a French newspaper, making a radio broadcast and recording a television programme - all excellent preparation for the AS Level French oral exams in the Summer Term.



To add the full flavour of France, one of the Modern Languages classrooms was transformed into the restaurant Chez Albert. Here the pupils were able to enjoy café et pains au chocolat in the morning and an excellent lunch of Vichyssoise, poulet cordon bleu and crème brûlée.

Spanish and German days were held earlier in the year.

Performing arts programme flourishes

Despite the constant pressure of exams, Bryanstonians have found time to take part in and enjoy a wide range of performing and visual arts.

In the Spring Term, the Lower Sixth Form presented an excellent weekend of theatre, music and art for their annual festival. In the Summer Term, there were three major dramatic productions: the Junior Dramatic Society performed *Clueless;* for Speech Day, the senior play was *What the Butler Saw* and the Music and Drama Departments presented *Dido and Aeneas* in the Main Hall. The Music Department also offered a diverse and full programme. The Senior Orchestra and Choir performed Mozart's Requiem in March and the Summer Concert included pieces by Fauré, Sibelius, Mascagni and Vivaldi. The Concert Band gave a number of performances both in and out of school and the String Orchestra and Brass Ensemble held lunchtime concerts in the Main Hall. Chamber music also flourished with four Bryanstonian ensembles taking part in the National Chamber Music Competition for Schools. The ensemble of Vicky Sayles, Kat Sayles and Mary Tonkin (seen practising below)was selected for the final concert in St John's, Smith Square, London and were rated, unofficially, in the top two nationally.



Kayaking marathon victory

Bryanston's kayakers triumphed once again in the gruelling 125 mile Devizes to Westminster Race. Competing for the first time since 1999 - their race was cancelled in 2000 (bad weather) and 2001 (foot and mouth disease) - the four Bryanston boats won a total of five trophies.

Competition in the Junior Doubles class was strong with 55 crews taking part. Ably supported by parents and Old Bryanstonians and played in to many of the portages by a Scottish piper, the Bryanston boys produced outstanding performances. Mark Burton and Nick Farren finished first as the fastest junior crew, winning the Berksonian Cup and the Wiltshire Gazette Shield. Jack Fraser and Simon Murray finished second, Matt Rogers and Seb van Aaken ninth and



Duncan Barnes and Nick Thomas tenth.

The combined times of the leading crews won them the Junior Team and Schools Team Trophies - the 11th and 14th times respectively that Bryanston has won these trophies. There was a prize, too, for the supporters - the Simon Zweck Memorial Trophy donated by some years ago by Bryanston for the support crew of the winning junior boat.

Young writers

Every First Year pupil donned the mantle of author in April's short story competition. The challenge: to produce the most compelling story in just 700 words on the theme of conflict.

The results were startling in the range of style and approaches adopted. The writing tended to the serious rather than comic and many chose to base their stories on recurrent adolescent themes.

So many entries were simply spellbinding in form as well as content that it was no easy task to allot prizes. However, the winners were Beatrice Bathe, Theo Evans, Eleanor Green, Christina Nethercott, William Stafford and Alex Williams.

Don Potter's 100th birthday

Don Potter, who taught at Bryanston for some four decades, celebrated his 100th birthday in April.



After the 1st World War, Don became one of the early Boy Scouts and worked closely with Baden-Powell at Gilwell Park. Here, he carved totem poles, built their log cabin and became an expert ropespinner. He was apprenticed to Eric Gill for six years in the 1930s and joined the staff at Bryanston in 1940. Don taught sculpture, pottery and metalwork. Sir Terence Conran and the renowned potters Richard Batterham and Mike Dodd are amongst the many former pupils to whom he was an inspiration. He also played the cello in the orchestra for many years and was in charge of the school's own fire brigade.

Don's work has been seen at the Whitechapel Gallery, the Royal Academy and in the Royal Society of British Sculptors travelling exhibition. His major sculptures include a 12ft figure of Christ at Zomba Cathedral in Malawi, a crucifix in St George's Chapel Windsor and the statue of Baden-Powell in Queensgate London.

Don retired from teaching at 82, but has carried on working ever since in his studio in Bryanston Village. This wonderfully rounded life will be celebrated in a book to be launched at the opening of an exhibition in Dorchester Museum on 20th September.
