On top of all this fun and games is the latest listing of LG ICC Rankings, both for

teams - the Test and ODI Championship tables – and individual players. This looks set to be a major story over the coming days and weeks as South Africa is now closer to unseating Australia at the head of the ODI listings than any side since the ODI table began in 2002.

As for this document, it is something which we will continue to produce and distribute on a pilot basis in the coming months and it is designed to offer information that may be of use to the media ahead of every major match around the world.

RIVALS COULD SWAP PLACES

ith one game to play things could hardly be tighter as just one point separates the sides in the ICC LG ODI Championship table.

India in fifth place can reverse the places if it wins the last match, which would leave it two points behind Pakistan in third place.

A win for fourth-placed Sri Lanka in the last match would extend the gap over India to three points and leave it just one point behind Pakistan heading into the ICC Cricket World Cup.

Both teams will also be watching New Zealand's performance as a convincing win against Australia could see both teams drop a place.

outh Africa's ODI series victory over Pakistan closed the gap behind Australia to two points in the ICC LG ODI Championship Table.

This means that if Australia lose the forthcoming three match series with New Zealand then South Africa will go into the ICC Cricket World Cup top of the table. New Zealand will be looking to leapfrog both Sri Lanka and India by winning the series 3-0 and head into the ICC Cricket World Cup in fourth place in the table, a 2-1 series victory for New Zealand could see it level on points with Sri Lanka if it wins the final match against India.

SPECIAL FEATURE: STRIKE BOWLING

Ithough Wasim Akram is the leading wickettaker in one-day internationals, with 502 victims, it is his Pakistan compatriot Waqar Younis who would arguably take the honours as the best ever bowler in ODIs.

Waqar took 416 wickets in his career but had a superior strike rate of 30.52 to cement his place at the top of the pile.

Of current bowlers, it is Australia's Brett Lee who is heading the pack. He is eighth in the leading wicket takers of current bowlers with 267 but his excellent strike rate of 28.94, only bettered by Shane Bond, makes him quite a handful to opposition batsmen.

The top three ex-players are Waqar, Saqlain Mushtaq and Allan Donald, who appear in the top 15 of both wicket-takers and strike rate, while of the current players it isn't quite so clear cut.

The difference in wicket-taking ability and strike rate has increased as the one-day game has changed over the years.

Lee and Ajit Agarkar are the only players to appear in both lists in first and third places respectively, while Makhaya Ntini seperates them in the combined list.

But these figures could all be turned on their heads with the emergence of Irfan Pathan, Nathan Bracken and Farveez Maharoof who are all proving themselves on the international stage with the ability to take wickets at regular intervals.

The fact that these two of the top three players come from emerging nations, shows that the talent is there

around the world, although Kenya's Lameck Onyango just pips his team mate on most effective strike rate.

As far as the more Full Member countries stack up, there are some familiar names in the list, with Shane Bond and Glenn McGrath staking their claims for the most effective ODI bowlers.

Zaheer Khan proved how useful he is for India in one-day cricket, with England's Liam Plunkett also making a late burst for inclusion.

Teams look for all-round talent

he ICC Cricket World Cup 2007 will be the greatest showcase of cricketing talent from around the world, with 16 teams all looking for their moment of glory. And key to success in the ODI form of the game is having a balanced line-up, with key players who can contribute with both bat and ball. Just 15 players have completed the unique CWC double of scoring 250 runs and taking 15 wickets in their CWC careers, while only five have managed to achieve the unique CWC double of scoring a half century and taking 4 wickets in a match. Interestingly the majority of these contributions have come from cricket's emerging nations, with current England coach Duncan Fletcher's match winning performance for his native Zimbabwe against Australia at the ICC Cricket World Cup 1983 probably the best known. Away from the CWC, only 12 players in the history of the game have managed to score a half century and take five wickets in an ODI, with Viv Richards and Paul Collingwood the only two players to have recorded the feat of scoring a century and taking five wickets. Of the men competing in the ICC Cricket World Cup 2007, Collingwood - whose repertoire also includes exceptional fielding - is expected to be one of the leading all-rounders, while Shaun Pollock is currently top of the official LG Rankings for all-rounders in ODI cricket.

Women's top four get ready for Indian challenge

he world's four leading women's cricket teams will gather in Chennai, India, next week to take part in a Quandrangular Series.

Featuring World champions Australia, host nation India and strong sides from New Zealand and England, the event will take place between 21 February and 5 March and see each team play all opposing teams twice with the two leading teams meeting again in the final.

The event will provide vital preparation for the players in the build up to the ICC Women's World Cup 2009 which will take place in Australia.

This will be the second time the event has been held, following the inaugural tournament in Lincoln. New Zealand, in 2003, when Australia defeated India by 109 runs to claim the title.

Lisa Sthalekar, Australia's vice captain, is looking forward to returning to the country of her birth for the

"I always enjoy touring India because of the challenge, my connection to India and playing against friends in the Indian side," she said.

"We're hopefully going to have the chance to play in front of some large crowds. The Indian fans know and love their cricket so that's something we're really looking forward to because that opportunity doesn't come around often." she added.

Australia will go into the tournament as favourites and will be boosted by the experienced batting of Karen Rolton, the ICC's first ever Women's Player of the Year in 2006, in their ranks but Sthalekar believes all four teams go into the event with a chance of claiming victory.

"We want to play as many international matches as we can. That's the best way for us to prepare for the World Cup in 2009 which is our major focus." she said.

"We were fortunate to have an extra series scheduled against New Zealand just prior to our domestic season and that was also good preparation ahead of this series.

"And as for this tournament, because it's the top four nations competing each match, it's like a semi-final stage at the World Cup," she added.

Veteran wicketkeeper-batsman Rebecca Rolls also believes her New Zealand side will benefit from the

trip, which should provide the opportunity for her to pass some important personal milestones of her own.

31-year-old Rolls needs 17 runs to become just the twelfth batsman to complete 2,000 ODI runs, and is only two matches from joining an elite group of eight players who have played 100 or more ODIs.

"The Quadrangular Series is the best place to compare yourself with others around the world as the best four teams are there." she said.

"Because of this, the intensity of games is higher than usual and mistakes more costly. Runs, wickets and results here are more valuable than in any other situation.

"Australia are always the team to beat in any situation and we will be keen to chalk up some wins after a losing a recent Rosebowl Series 5-0. We have many things to improve on from that series, most importantly capitalizing on winning situations.

"Even though we had a victorious series against India (in New Zealand in 2005), they are much tougher in their own backyard. They have a wide variety of skills [and] if they gather some momentum with a few wins, they can be difficult to stop."

The event is the latest step in the development of the women's game, which has progressed rapidly since the International Women's Cricket Council merged with the ICC in 2005.

The first Women's World Cup was held in 1973 and there have been five subsequent events, with Australia dominating the sport with five World Cup victories and England and New Zealand both having won the title once.

The IWCC had 15 members and since integration the women's game has been growing fast. There are now 42 ICC Members with formal girls and/or women's teams playing in structured cricket competitions.

A further 23 do not have competitive teams yet but do have girls in junior development initiatives. That makes 65 of the ICC's 97 Members with some women's cricket and events such as the Quandrangular Series will hopefully contribute to further increasing the profile of the women's game worldwide.

'Determined' Ireland look to defend title against Canada in final

fter several months of waiting, Canada now knows that it will be playing defending champions Ireland in the final of the ICC Intercontinental Cup 2006 after Adrian Birrell's side defeated the United Arab Emirates inside three days this week to make sure it tops Group A.

After what had been a relatively disappointing set of results in the recent ICC World Cricket League Division 1 in Nairobi, Ireland was determined to set the record straight and return to winning ways.

And Ireland did it in style, taking the game by the scruff of the neck on the first morning and never relinquishing its grip. The team eventually won the game by an innings and 170 runs, demonstrating that although it did not perform to its best in Kenya, Ireland is still very much a force to be reckoned with at this level.

This sets up a final between Ireland and Andy Pick's Canada, at a date and venue yet to be decided but most likely it will be at a neutral ground some time towards the end of May.

The stars of the match for Ireland were Eoin Morgan (209 not out) and Andre Botha (157). The two left-handers put on 360 for the third wicket as Ireland amassed a huge first-innings total of 531-5 declared.

It is a record ICC Intercontinental Cup partnership for any wicket, overtaking the previous best of 304 set by Ireland's Jeremy Bray and Niall O'Brien in the semi-final of the 2005 event against the UAE in Windhoek, Namibia.

"I was delighted with how the players responded after Kenya," said Ireland coach Adrian Birrell, who was using the extra day in the UAE today to work on his golf swing.

"I have never seen a team more determined to win than we were in Abu Dhabi. We were disappointed after Kenya but not disheartened and we took control of the match, more or less from ball one," he said.

Canada v Ireland

Scotland top of ICC Associate ODI Rankings after WCL Div. 1

CC World Cricket League Division 1 (WCL Div. 1) finalist Scotland has established itself at the top of the ICC Associate ODI Rankings following a very successful period for the ICC Trophy champions.

With Kenya represented in the main LG ICC ODI Championship table, the ICC Associate ODI Rankings feature the next five sides in the world, all of whom play matches with ODI status.

Scotland lost to Kenya in the final of the WCL Div. 1 in Nairobi last week but had already beaten the Netherlands, Canada and Ireland in the tournament. In the qualifying matches against other Associates, Scotland can currently boast a 69 per cent win rate, compared to 50 per cent from next best team, the Netherlands.

Ireland finds itself in third place with a 44 per cent win rate after a relatively disappointing event for one of the pre-tournament favourites. Canada is fourth with 33 per cent and Bermuda fifth with 28 per cent.

Currently, the ICC Associates ODI Rankings does not include Kenya and it will continue to appear on the main LG ICC ODI Championship until 2009. Any ODIs played between Kenya and any of the other five top Associates will therefore have no rating impact on Kenya itself but will still count towards the others' ranking.

These are still the early stages of the ICC Associate ODI Rankings. Following the ICC Trophy in 2005, ODI status was granted to matches involving the teams that came in the top five (Scotland, Ireland, Canada, Bermuda and the Netherlands) as part of their preparation for the ICC Cricket World Cup 2007.

Once an Associate has played at least 10 matches in total, it has the opportunity to be promoted to the main LG ICC ODI Championship table (currently comprising the ten ICC Full Members plus Kenya).

To gain this promotion, the Associate must either achieve two wins against Full Members or achieve one win against a Full Member and also have won more than 60 per cent of its matches against other Associates on the rankings table.

The Associate would then have a ranking on the main table, initially based on its results in all ODIs played against any of the 11 existing rated teams, i.e. the ten Full Members and Kenya, during the qualifying period. Then, to progress to a rating, it would need to have played at least eight ODIs (over the previous two to three year period, updated every August) against teams who, at the time, were also rated on the LG ICC ODI Championship table.
