SENATE ISSUES

1. Filibuster—Point of order on cloture rule to permit debate to be limited by vote of three-fifths of those Senators present and voting, rather than the two-thirds present and voting currently required. Point of order defeated: 37-61, January 18, 1967.

A vote to table point of order is plus; a vote against, minus.

Minority leader Dirksen (R-Ill.) made point of order that the McGovern motion to begin consideration of Senate Resolution 6 was contrary to Senate rules because it permitted a majority of the Senate to shut off debate on the motion. McGovern's motion to table (reject) Dirksen's point of order was the key vote.

2. Settlement of the Railway Labor Dispute—An amendment to provide for government impounding of 10 percent of the railroads' profits during the period in which a special Presidential panel's settlement terms were in effect. Amendment failed: 23-59, June 7, 1967.

A vote for the amendment is plus; a vote against, minus.

Senator Yarborough (D-Tex.) moved to amend the railway labor dispute legislation by providing for government impounding of 10 percent of the railroads' profit.

3. Congressional District Standards—Substitute amendment permitting a population variation for House districts of no more than 10 percent beginning with the 1968 election. Amendment accepted: 44-39, June 8, 1967.

A vote for the amendment is plus; a vote against, minus.

Senator Kennedy (D-Mass.) moved a substitute amendment for the House bill as reported out of the Senate committee. The House bill permitted 35 percent population variation for House districts for the 1968 and 1970 elections. Kennedy's amendment permitted a population variation of no more than 10 percent beginning with the 1968 election and made other revisions.

4. Selective Service—Final vote on acceptance of the conference report on the Military Selective Service Act of 1967. Conference report accepted: 72-23, June 14, 1967.

A vote against the report is plus; a vote for, minus.

The conference report extended the military draft and related statutes for four years, from July 1, 1967, to July 1, 1971; prohibited the President from instituting a draft lottery; and limited the President's authority to order other draft revisions.

5. Open Housing—Amendment to delete funds for work on federal project where state or city had no open housing provision. Amendment rejected: 47-37, July 12, 1967.

A vote for the amendment is plus; a vote against, minus.

Senator Pastore (D-R.I.) moved to amend the Atomic Energy Commission authorization by deleting the \$7,333,000 authorization for the proposed nuclear accelerator at Weston, Illinois. Neither the city of Weston nor the state of Illinois had open occupancy statutes.

6. Foreign Aid Authorization-Arms—Amendment to provide financing for arms sales to underdeveloped countries. Amendment defeated: 50-43, August 15, 1967.

A vote against the amendment is plus; a vote for, minus.

Senator Jackson (D-Wash.) and Senator Tower (R-Tex.) moved an amendment to restore a special Defense Department revolving fund, removed by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, which provided financing for arms sales to underdeveloped countries. The amendment also provided new authority for the Defense Department to buy promissory notes given arms manufacturers by nations purchasing the arms.

7. Asset Disclosures—Amendment requiring asset disclosures by Members of Congress and candidates for Congress. Amendment rejected: 46-42, September 12, 1967.

A vote for the amendment is plus; a vote against, minus.

Senator Clark (D-Pa.) moved to amend the Election Reform Act of 1967 to require Members of Congress and candidates for Congress to disclose their assets, liabilities, securities, gifts and other outside income.

8. Housing and Urban Development Fund—Amendment to increase authorization for Housing and Urban Development participation certificate sales by 1.8 billion. Amendment adopted: 57-30, September 21, 1967.

A vote for the amendment is plus; a vote against, minus.

The Senate Appropriations Committee offered an amendment to the Independent Office and Department of Housing and Urban Development Appropriations Act for fiscal 1968. The amendment increased the House-approved authorization for HUD participation certificate sales by \$1,804,000,000 from \$581,000,000 to \$2,385,000,000.

9. Emergency Jobs—Amendment in the Economic Opportunity Act of 1967 to authorize \$925 million for an emergency job program. Rejected: 47-42, October 4, 1967.

A vote for the amendment is plus; a vote against, minus.

Senator Prouty (R-Vt.) moved to amend Title II of the Economic Opportunity Amendments of 1967, inserted in the Poverty Program by Senator Clark's Poverty Subcommittee, by deleting the \$2.8 billion emergency job program. The Prouty amendment authorized substitution of a one year \$925 million emergency job program, emphasizing incentives to get businesses to participate in job training.

10. War on Poverty—Amendment to reduce the War on Poverty funds by \$198 million. Amendment defeated: 50-36, October 5, 1967.

A vote against the amendment is plus; a vote for, minus.

Senator Williams (R-Del.) offered an amendment to reduce the recommended authorization of the Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee by \$198 million. This would have reduced the authorization to the amount requested by the President.

11. Subversive Activities Control Board—Amendment abolishing the Subversive Activities Control Board. Amendment rejected: 58-17, October 23, 1967.

A vote for the amendment is plus; a vote against, minus.

Senator Brooke (R-Mass.) offered an amendment which would have abolished the Subversive Activities Control Board as of January 1, 1968.

12. Social Security-Welfare—Amendment requiring mandatory participation of all states in the Aid to Families with Dependent Children Program. Amendment accepted: 39-36, November 20, 1967.

A vote for the amendment is plus; a vote against, minus.

Senator Harris (D-Okla.) moved to amend the Social Security Amendments of 1967 by making it mandatory that all states participate in Aid to Families with Dependent Children Programs (regardless of the presence of an unemployed father in the home).

13. Social Security-Generic Drugs—Motion to table amendment limiting government reimbursement for drugs to their cost on a generic name basis. Tabling motion defeated: 41-37, November 21, 1967.

A vote against the motion is plus; a vote for, minus.

Senator Hartke (D-Ind.) made a motion to table an amendment by Senator Long (D-La.) limiting government reimbursement for prescription drugs purchased through federally aided welfare programs to their cost on a generic or established name basis rather than by trademark name. The Long amendment passed 43-37.

- (+) Indicates a vote which ADA believes to be in harmony with liberal policies.
- (-) Indicates a vote which ADA believes to be contrary to liberal policies.
- (+p) Indicates a pair in favor of what ADA considers the liberal position.
- (-p) Indicates a pair contrary to what ADA considers the liberal position.
- (+a) Means the member was absent but was officially announced as favoring the liberal position.

- (-a) Means a member was absent but was officially announced as opposed to the liberal position.
- (A) Indicates the member was officially recorded as absent.

The number next to a Representative's name refers to his district.

(AL) means the Representative has no specific district but was elected "at large."

Democrats as the majority party are listed in bold-face type, Republicans in light face.

Liberal Quotient (LQ): measure of the liberalism of a member of Congress determined by the percentage of his votes cast, paired or announced, in support of liberal policy measured against the number of votes counted.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Voting Record is offered as a guide in judging the performance of Senators and Congressmen on issues of importance. Readers, however, will recognize the Record's inherent limitations. It is, of course, no measure of a legislator's creative ability or the diligence with which he performs his work in committee. It does not reflect on its face the failure of the Congress to deal with some major issues or the degree of responsibility of individual legislators. These judgments cannot be made in statistics or percentages; they require the use of other yardsticks and careful scrutiny on an individual basis of the capability and performance of legislators.

HOUSE ISSUES

1. Seating of Rep. Adam C. Powell (D-N.Y.)—Motion to vote on resolution authorizing and directing the Speaker to administer the oath of office to Rep. Adam C. Powell (D-N.Y.). Motion rejected: 305-106, January 10, 1967.

A vote for the motion is plus; a vote against, minus.

Congressman Udall (D-Ariz.) moved the previous question, cutting off debate and precluding amendments. The previous question was House Resolution 1, authorizing and directing the Speaker of the House to administer the oath of office to Rep. Powell and stipulating that the question of his final right to a seat be referred to a select committee of seven members, to be appointed by the Speaker, which would report its recommendations to the House within 60 days. If the motion had carried the question of seating Rep. Powell would have been resolved on the introduced resolution.

2. 21-Day Rule—Motion to consider resolution providing for adoption of the Rules of the 89th Congress, including the 21-Day Rule. Motion rejected: 225-195, January 10, 1967.

A vote for the motion is plus; a vote against, minus.

Congressman Albert (D-Okla.) moved the previous question, cutting off debate and precluding amendments. The previous question was House Resolution 7, to adopt the rules of the 89th Congress, including the 21-Day Rule, as rules of the 90th Congress. The 21-Day Rule, added in 1965, permitted the Speaker of the House to recognize the chairman or any other member of a legislative committee to ask for consideration of a bill which had been favorably reported by the committee, if the bill had been before the Rules Committee for 21 days without receiving a rule (special resolution) for floor consideration.

3. Vietnam Funds—Motion to recommit the Vietnam supplemental appropriations authorization. Recommittal rejected: 372-18, March 2, 1967.

A vote for the motion is plus; a vote against, minus.

Congressman Brown (D-Calif.) moved to recommit the fiscal 1967 supplemental appropriations authorization of \$4.5 billion for the Vietnam war, with instructions to add an amendment stating the sense-of-Congress that no funds authorized by the bill were to be used to carry out military operations in or over North Vietnam. The intention was to halt the bombing of North Vietnam and ensure against future land war in North Vietnam.

4. House Un-American Activities Committee—Motion to recommit funding resolution with instructions to justify funding of HUAC. Recommittal defeated: 304-92, April 5, 1967.

A vote for recommitment is plus; a vote against, minus.

Congressman Edwards (D-Calif.) moved to recommit the resolution providing funds for the House Un-American Activities Committee with instructions that the House Administration Committee hold public hearings on the justification of funds for HUAC.

5. Congressional Redistricting—Passage of committee bill setting congressional redistricting standards. Bill passed: 289-63, August 27, 1967.

A vote against passage is plus; a vote for, minus.

The House Judiciary Committee Bill, introduced by Chairman Cellar (D-N.Y.), established a two-stage process toward securing equally populated, non-gerrymandered districts and requiring single-member districts for the U.S. House of Representatives. The first stage allowed a 30 percent variation between districts until 1972; the second stage, allowing a 10 percent variation, was delayed until 1972.

6. Rent Supplements—Motion to amend HUD Appropriations Act to delete new rent supplement funding of \$10 million a year. Amendment accepted: 232-171, May 17, 1967.

A vote against the amendment is plus; a vote for, minus.

Congressman Davis (R-Wis.) moved to amend the Independent Offices and Department of Housing and Urban Development Appropriations Act for fiscal 1968 by deleting language permitting the government to sign 40-year contracts with private non-profit housing sponsors and to pay an additional \$10 million a year in rent supplements for low-income families. The effect of the amendment would have been to limit rent supplements to a \$5 million appropriation, for payments under previous contracts.

7. Model Cities—Motion to recommit bill with instructions to delete \$225 million from Model Cities funds. Recommittal rejected: 213-193, May 17, 1967.

A vote against recommittal is plus; a vote for, minus.

Congressman Michel (R-Ill.) moved to recommit the Independent Offices and Department of Housing and Urban Development Appropriations Act for fiscal 1968 to the House Appropriations Committee with instructions to delete \$75 million for urban renewal in Model City Project areas and \$150 million in other Model City grants.

8. Food Stamps Program—Motion to amend the program to require states to pay 20 percent of the cost of the Food Stamp Program. Amendment defeated: 191-173, June 8, 1967.

A vote against amendment is plus; a vote for, minus.

Congressman Poage (D-Tex.), Agriculture Committee Chairman, introduced committee amendment which would require states to pay 20 percent of the cost of the Food Stamp Program.

9. Elementary Education—Motion to amend the Education Act to provide that funds to states be distributed by state departments of education according to a state plan. Amendment accepted: 230-185, May 24, 1967.

A vote against the amendment is plus; a vote for, minus.

Congressman Green (D-Ore.) moved an amendment to the Elementary and Secondary Education Amendments of 1967, allotting funds for supplementary education centers under Title III to the state departments of education, to be distributed by them according to a state plan. The effect of this amendment is to provide block grants to states.

10. Anti-Riot Bill—Motion to amend the U.S. Code to prohibit travel or use of any facilities in interstate or foreign commerce with intent to incite a riot or other violent disturbances. Bill accepted: 347-70, July 19, 1967.

A vote against passage is plus; a vote for, minus.

11. Rat Control—Motion to adopt a resolution providing for an open rule for floor consideration of the Rat Control and Extermination Act. Resolution rejected: 207-176, July 20, 1967.

A vote for the resolution is plus; a vote against, minus.

Rejection of the Rat Control and Extermination Act of 1967 occurred when the House rejected a resolution that would have permitted formal House debate and action on the bill.

12. Civil Rights—Passage of the bill providing additional protection against interference with persons exercising or attempting to exercise civil rights. Bill passed: 326-93, August 16, 1967.

A vote for the bill is plus; a vote against, minus.

The bill makes it a crime to injure, intimidate, or interfere with persons exercising a number of civil rights. The bill is primarily aimed at protecting civil rights workers.

13. Foreign Aid—Passage of foreign economic and military aid authorization. Authorization accepted: 202-194, August 25, 1967.

A vote for the authorization is plus; a vote against, minus.

The bill authorized \$2,815,408,000 for foreign economic and military aid in fiscal 1968, and further amended the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961.

14. War on Poverty—Motion to recommit Office of Economic Opportunity funding authorization and reduce funds by \$460 million. Re-committal adopted: 221-190, November 15, 1967.

A vote against recommitment is plus; a vote for, minus.

Congressman Ayres (R-Ohio) moved to recommit the Economic Opportunity Act Authorization to the Education and Labor Committee with instructions to reduce the fiscal 1968 authorization for anti-poverty programs by \$460 million—from the \$2.06 billion provided in the Committee bill to \$1.6 billion.

15. Meat Inspection—Motion to instruct House Conferees to accept the Senate amendments to the Wholesome Meat Act of 1967. Motion rejected: 207-166, November 29, 1967.

A vote for the motion is plus; a vote against, minus.

Congressman Smith (D-Iowa) moved to instruct the House Conferees to accept Senate amendments to the Wholesome Meat Act of 1967. The Senate amendments required intrastate meat plant operations to meet federal standards and, in certain cases, to be inspected by federal officials.
