SENATE ISSUES

1. Electoral Vote Count

Resolution objecting to the electoral vote cast by a North Carolina Republican presidential elector for third party candidates George W. Wallace and Curtis Lemay. Objection rejected 58-33, January 6, 1969.

A vote for the resolution is plus, a vote against minus.

The objection was offered in the Senate by Senator Edmund Muskie (D-Maine) when the elector's vote was cast and counted for the third party candidates although the elector was pledged to support the Nixon-Agnew ticket which had carried North Carolina.

2. Cloture

Motion to invoke cloture on a motion to consider the Senate Resolution amending Senate rule 22 (the filibuster rule) to reduce the proportion of affirmative votes required to invoke cloture from two-thirds to three-fifths. Motion accepted, rule adopted 51-47, January 16, 1969.

A vote for invoking cloture is plus, a vote against minus.

The motion to invoke cloture was made by Senator Frank Church (D-Idaho). Since the issue involved a rules change at the start of a new Congress, liberals believe that only a majority of the Senate (51 votes) is necessary for cloture. Vice President Humphrey supported the liberal position (see following issue).

3. Rules Change

An appeal was made of Vice President Humphrey's decision that a majority is sufficient to invoke cloture on a rules change. A vote yes is to sustain the decision. Decision reversed 53-45, January 16, 1969.

A vote to uphold the Humphrey decision is plus, a vote no is minus.

4. Nuclear Test Ban Treaty

Ervin reservation to the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty on nuclear attacks. Any reservation to the treaty would undermine the agreement. Reservation rejected 69-25, on March 13, 1969.

A vote against the reservation is plus, a vote for minus.

5. Education—Supplemental Appropriation

Yarborough-Pell amendment exempting from fiscal 1970 ceiling some educational assistance programs in the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1967. The effect of the amendment is to free more education funds for the inner city. Amendment adopted 52-43, June 18, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

6. Health—Supplemental Appropriations

Amendment exempting health activities of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare from the fiscal 1970 spending ceiling. Amendment rejected 47-45, June 18, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

7. Otepka Nomination

Motion by Senator Steven Young (D-Ohio) to recommit to the Judiciary Committee the nomination of the reactionary Otto Otepka as a member of the Subversive Activities Control

Board. Otepka actively sought and accepted significant help from the organized right wing including the John Birch Society and Liberty Lobby. Motion rejected 56-35, June 24, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

8. National Commitments

Mundt-Dodd substitute amendment defining a national commitment as a promise to a foreign government to use armed forces in the event of hostilities and requiring Congressional consent to such commitments. Amendment rejected 50-36, June 25, 1969.

A vote against is plus, a vote for minus.

The Mundt-Dodd substitute narrowed the definition of national commitments. The committee resolution which the substitute would have amended defined a national commitment as the use of armed forces on foreign territory or a promise to assist a foreign country by armed force or financial resources, and affirmed the role of Congress with respect to making national commitments. The resolution itself passed the Senate 70-16 on June 25, 1969.

9. ABM—Hart-Cooper Amendment

Amendment to the Military Procurement Authorization Bill for fiscal 1970, restricting funds for the Safeguard ABM system to research and development, and prohibiting deployment. Amendment rejected 51-49, August 6, 1969.

A vote for is a plus, a vote against minus.

The amendment, introduced by Senators Philip Hart (D-Mich.) and John Sherman Cooper (R-Ky.), was the rallying point for Senate ABM critics during the weeks of debate on the ABM. The Hart-Cooper amendment would have made unequivocally clear the intention of the Senate to prohibit the deployment of any component or element of the ABM system on any proposed site. The 51-49 vote on the amendment gives critics of excessive defense spending and nuclear policy a foundation for continued rational discourse on national defense and security policy.

10. Defense Auditing

Schweiker amendment to the Military Procurement Authorization Bill for fiscal 1970 setting up auditing over defense contracts. Amendment adopted 47-46, August 7, 1969.

A vote for is a plus, a vote against minus.

The amendment introduced by Senator Richard Schweiker (R-Pa.) directs the Secretary of Defense and the Comptroller General who heads the General Accounting Office to set up a reporting system for major contracts entered into by the Department of Defense, any of its departments or agencies, or any armed service. It directs the Secretary of Defense to transmit quarterly the findings of each review to the Congress and its respective committees on Armed Services and Appropriations. The Comptroller General will make an independent audit of the reporting system developed by the Secretary of Defense and furnish to Congress annually a report as to the adequacy of the reporting system.

11. New Bomber Fund Cuts

An amendment offered by Senator McGovern (D-S.D.) to the Military Procurement Authorization Act for fiscal 1970 to reduce funds

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Voting Record is offered as a guide in judging the performance of Senators and Congressmen on issues of importance. Readers, however, will recognize the Record's inherent limitations. It is, of course, no measure of a legislator's creative ability or the diligence with which he performs his work in committee. It does not reflect on its face the failure of the Congress to deal with some major issues or the degree of responsibility of individual legislators. These judgments cannot be made in statistics or percentages; they require the use of other yardsticks and careful scrutiny on an individual basis of the capability and performance of legislators.

It may be noted that many procedural votes have been chosen. Votes on rules for debate or on procedures for amending important legislation on the floor often reveal basic liberal and conservative positions which are obscured in the vote for final passage or defeat.

The mechanical process of publishing the 1969 Voting Record prevented the inclusion of key votes that occurred in the last few days of the Congressional session. These votes will be included in the 1970 Voting Record.

for the Air Force's new AMSA-BLA bomber from \$95 million to \$20 million. The amendment was defeated 56-32, September 16, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

12. Free Food Stamps

Substitute amendment authorizing free food stamps for families with monthly incomes under \$60 and authorizing \$1.25 billion for the program for fiscal 1970. The amendment was offered by Senator McGovern (D-S.D.). Adopted 56-40, September 24, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

13. OEO Legal Services

An amendment to the OEO authorization bill, offered by Senator Murphy (R-Calif.), giving governors veto power over legal services projects in their state and eliminating the OEO director's right to override the governor's veto on legal services programs. Adopted 45-40, October 14, 1969.

A vote against is plus, a vote for minus.

14. Urban Renewal Funds

Amendment to HUD appropriations bill offered by Senator Hart (D-Mich.) to increase funds for urban renewal by \$587.5 million. The effect of the amendment would have been to accelerate the Neighborhood Development Program. Rejected 36-34, November 10, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

15. Haynsworth Nomination

The Senate rejected President Nixon's nomination of Clement Haynsworth, Jr. as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court by a 55-45 vote, November 21, 1969.

A vote opposing confirmation is plus, a vote for is minus.

16. Reduction of Oil and Gas Depletion Allowance

An amendment to the 1969 tax reform bill by Senator Williams (R-Del.) that would reduce the depletion allowance on oil and gas from 23 percent to 20 percent. (The Senate earlier had voted a reduction from the present 27.5 percent to 23 percent.) Rejected 52-38, December 1, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

17. Voter Registration

An amendment to the 1969 Tax Reform Act allowing tax-exempt foundations to finance non-partisan voter registration drives carried on in more than one state and providing other conditions which foundations must meet in supporting this type of activity was offered by Senator Yarborough (D-Texas). Accepted 53-35, December 4, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

18. Social Security

An amendment to the 1969 Tax Reform Act offered by Senators Byrd (D-W. Va.) and Mansfield (D-Mont.) to provide minimum Social Security payments of \$100 for individuals and \$150 for married couples, and increasing the Social Security tax base from \$7,800 to \$12,000 beginning in 1973. The amendment was adopted 48-41, December 5, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

1969 SENATE

HOUSE ISSUES

1. Powell Seating

Motion to move the previous question on the resolution to seat Congressman Adam Clayton Powell (D-N.Y.). Motion defeated 248-175, January 3, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

The motion to move the previous question was made by Congressman Emanuel Celler (D-N.Y.). Adoption of the motion would have ended debate, precluded amendments and forced a vote on a resolution to seat Powell outright. The resolution which was adopted seated Congressman Powell but additionally fined him \$25,000 and stripped him of seniority.

2. Electoral Vote Count

Resolution objecting to the electoral vote cast by a North Carolina Republican presidential elector for third party candidates George W. Wallace and Curtis Lemay. Rejected 229-169, January 6, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

3. HUAC

Motion to move the previous question on the resolution to change the name of the House Un-American Activities Committee. Motion adopted 262-123, February 18, 1969.

A vote against is plus, a vote for minus.

The motion to move the previous question on the resolution was made by Congressman William Colmer (D-Miss.). The effect of the motion was to end debate and preclude amendments to the resolution. Amendments to shift the functions of HUAC to the Judiciary Committee and to abolish the Un-American Activities panel would have been introduced if the motion had been defeated.

4. Education

Amendment to the Elementary and Secondary Education Amendments of 1969 which would limit the extension of the Education Act to two years rather than to five years. Adopted 235-184, April 23, 1969.

A vote against is plus, a vote for minus.

The House Education and Labor Committee recommended a five-year extension which would have made funding of Elementary and Secondary Education programs more certain.

5. Cigarette Labeling

Motion to recommit and thereby kill the cigarette labeling bill. The bill, tailored to the tobacco lobby's interests, prohibited for six years restrictions on cigarette advertising. The motion was rejected 252-137, June 18, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

6. Resurrection Cities

Bill prohibiting camping, sit-ins, overnight use or construction of temporary structures on public property in the District of Columbia. Passed 327-51, June 11, 1969.

A vote against is plus, a vote for minus.

This legislation bars all future Resurrection Cities. It places burdens on those seeking permits for non-prohibited activities to post bond if officials issuing permits anticipate any damage to public property.

7. Income Tax Surcharge

Bill to continue the income tax surcharge. Passed 210-205, June 30, 1969.

A vote against is plus, a vote for minus.

The bill extends the surtax and thus accepts President Nixon's tax package without initiating meaningful tax reform.

8. Pentagon Picketing

Motion to recommit the Military Construction Authorization with instructions to strike the section preventing demonstrations and picketing at the Pentagon. Rejected 322-87, August 5, 1969.

A vote for is plus, a vote against minus.

The motion by Congressman Charles Whalen (R-Ohio) was the last opportunity for eliminating the anti-picketing clause from the bill. The bill prevents further demonstrations at the Department of Defense and clearly violates the Constitution.

9. Defense Procurement Authorization

Motion to move the previous question by Rep. Rivers (D-S.C.) on the O'Konski (D-Wis.) motion to recommit the Defense Procurement Authorization. To oppose the motion has the effect of supporting a 10% cut in the military procurement legislation. Motion passed 223-141, October 3, 1969.

A vote for the motion to move the previous question, thereby cutting off debate, is minus; a vote against plus.

10. Water Pollution Abatement—AEC Appropriations

Motion to move the previous question on the appropriations bill for fiscal 1970 that includes funds to halt water pollution. To oppose the motion has the effect of supporting \$1 billion to fight water pollution. Motion passed 215-187, October 8, 1969.

A vote for the motion, thereby cutting off debate, is minus; a vote against plus.

11. Selective Service Reform

A motion to move the previous question and thereby end debate on selective service. To op-

pose the motion has the effect of supporting comprehensive draft reform beyond the lottery system. The motion was passed 265-129, October 30, 1969.

A vote for is minus, a vote against is plus.

12. Vietnam

No amendment rule for consideration of a House resolution on Vietnam—"Toward Peace with Justice in Vietnam"—in support of the Administration's Vietnam policy. The motion to move the previous question on the rule passed 225-132, December 1, 1969. To oppose the motion has the effect of supporting alternatives to the pro-Nixon Administration Vietnam resolution.

A vote against is plus, a vote for is minus.

13. Vietnam

Adoption of the resolution, "Toward Peace with Justice in Vietnam" by 334-55, December 2, 1969. The resolution endorsed the Nixon policy and gives the President carte blanche in dealing with the Vietnam problem. No hearings were held on this resolution. Further, the House floor rule on debate forbade any amendments.

A vote against is plus, a vote for is minus.

14. Voting Rights Act of 1970

A simple five-year extension of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 which expires August 6, 1970, was voted out by the House Judiciary Committee and brought to the House floor. An Administration substitute that drastically weakens Voting Rights in the deep South was offered by Minority Floor Leader Ford (R-Mich.) as an amendment to the Committee's simple extension. The House voted 208-203 to replace voting rights with the new Nixon proposal, December 11, 1969.

A vote for the Administration proposal is a minus, a vote against plus.

15. Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO)

A motion by Rep. Ayres (R-Ohio) to recommit to the House Education and Labor Committees the committee bill which will extend OEO and its programs another two years. Motion failed by 231-163 roll-call vote, December 12, 1969.

A vote against is plus, a vote for is minus.

The motion to recommit was made after opponents of the anti-poverty agency attempted to substitute for the committee bill a measure sponsored by Reps. Quie (R-Minn.), Green (D-Ore.), Ayres (R-Ohio), Giaimo (D-Conn.) and Waggonner (D-La.), which would turn control of OEO's most vital programs—Headstart, VISTA, Legal Services, etc.—over to the states and their governors.
