### 2018 Winter Bids Launch Media Campaigns

For the first time since becoming candidates for the 2018 Winter Olympics, the three cities in the race hold briefings for the international media.

Teams from Annecy, Munich and PyeongChang appeared in a series of briefings Monday at the Main Media Center in Vancouver.

The three cities are in the applicant phase of the campaign when only limited contact with international media is permitted. The 2018 bids are taking part in the official observer program for the Vancouver Olympics and will file their first dossiers to the IOC next month.

The international campaign for the bids will begin in June, after the IOC Executive Board rules on which, if not all three cities, will be accepted as finalists. The IOC will vote on the 2018 host at the Session in Durban.

#### Annecy Proposes Return to **French Alps**

The panel included Mayor Luc Rigault, French Minister for Sport Roselyne Bayot, French NOC President Denis Masseglia, 1992/1998 alpine bronze medalist Florence Mesnada, 2002 ice dancer Gwendal Peizerat and bid chief Edgar Grospiron, 1992 moguls gold medalist.

Missing from the dais were either of France's two IOC members, Jean Claude Killy or Guy Drut.

Grospiron says that Annecy offers a solid platform to stage the Games.

"We have exceptional, spectacular scenery with Mont Blanc, economic strength with one million tourists every year and so we believe that our bid is credible."

Annecy would be the third Olympics for the region, including 1924 in Chamonix and 1992 in Albertville. (cont' page 4)

### The View From Here: Good Things for Vancouver

Ok, Vancouver is taking a stumble or two as it tries to hit full stride for the remainder of the Games.

But there are also a lot of good things to say about these Winter Olympics, despite the early miscues.

The good of Vancouver starts appropriately with arrival at the Vancouver airport. Even before the Olympics, it was one of the easiest airports in the world to use. Volunteers and staff at desks just past passport control quickly processed accreditations, making Olympic visitors good to go well before hitting baggage claim.

Those airport volunteers - and their

colleagues across the Olympic theater -- are giving these Games a big boost with their enthusiasm and willingness to help. The volunteer corps is always the backbone of Games-time operations, and in Vancouver they are keeping things running.

Security is unobtrusive. So far it's been incident-free, except for the anti-Games hooligan attack last weekend.


For media, Vancouver organizers have delivered a special treat: freedom from a mag and bag check to enter the Main Media Center. The bag and x-ray are still there, but only employed on a random basis. At the transport mall underneath the MMC,

mag and bag so that they are cleared before arriving at the venues.

The tastes of Vancouver are many and varied and well-priced. This may be the best food city of any recent Olympics, summer or winter.

The men's hockey tournament is underway,

The Swiss Alpine team seem to like Canadian snow. Veteran Swiss speedster Didier Defago won Monday's men's downhill in Whistler, ending a 22-year gold-medal drought for Switzerland in Olympic Alpine events. The Swiss hadn't won alpine gold since Purmin Zurbriggen in 1988 in Calgary. Defago, who at 32 years and 4 months, also became the oldest winner in the history of the event.

"This is one of the most beautiful days of my life," said Defago at the post-race press conference. "The conditions were perfect for me. I knew I would do well, but I never expected to do this well. I had a great year with Wengen and Kitzbuhel. A medal had to come eventually for me. This was always my goal. I wanted to bring home more weight in my luggage than I came here with."

Defago skied flawlessly on a the perfectlygroomed Dave Murray course in Whistler to win

in 1:54.31. Aksel Lund Svindal of Norway, the defending overall World Cup champion, captured the silver medal, finishing just 0.07 seconds behind Defago. Bode Miller of the United States finished third, 0.09 back.

"It's such a relief to get a medal," said Miller. "The fact that those guys beat me to the hundredth of a second doesn't bother me." Miller, who disappointed many at the Turin Games in Italy amidst reports of partying and lack of dedication, was happy with his bronze-medal performance in Whistler.

"It was hard for me to push without making mistakes," said Miller, who won two silver medals at the 2002 Salt Lake City Games. "I skied really well at the top but I was pushing too hard."

After a massive effort by race officials and hundreds of hard-working volunteers to get the course race-ready following Saturday's postponement, Mother Nature also lent a hand with cold overnight temperatures and clear skies for Monday's race.

"The conditions were great," said Canadian Manuel Osborne-Paradis, who finished a disappointing 17th on his home track. "There's no way I thought it would be in such good shape after the weather we've been having."

Canada's Eric Guay finished a respectable 5th, while fellow Canuck Jan Hudec finished 25th. The other 'Canadian Cowboy' in the race, Whistler local Robbie Dixon, missed a gate near the top of the course and was disqualified.

The men's downhill was originally scheduled for Saturday but was postponed for 48 hours due to the mix of warm temperatures, heavy snowfall, rain and fog that have wreaked havoc with the Alpine schedule. +

Annecy offers a three-cluster venue plan. Figure skating, speedskating, biathlon, ski jumping and cross country will be near Annecy. A cluster of venues is located about 100km away in Mount Blanc/Chamonix, including alpine events and hockey.

Sliding events are set for La Plagne, 100 km south of Annecy, used for the 1992 Games.

Rigault estimates the budget for Annecy is \$1.5 billion, noting that 65 percent of the venues exist.

#### PyeongChang Hopes Third Time Is the Charm

The PyeongChang bid for 2018 has learned from the losing bids for the 2010 and 2014 Winter Olympics, says cochairman and Governor Jin Sun Kim.

This is a "more advanced PyeongChang, a new Pyeongchang," he said in a presentation. "As you know we have had our disappointment in the past, but we've never given up our hopes and dreams."

Kim was joined by Yang Ho Cho, cochairman and former chairman of Korean

The panel did not include the country's two IOC members: Dae Sung Moon, a member of the athletes' commission since 2008, and Kun Hee Lee, the former Samsung chairman who was reinstated by the IOC after a pardon on corporate corruption charges.

Cho did not specify what Lee's role would be with the bid beyond working as an IOC member. "Like in your country, when somebody is pardoned, we're moving forward," he said.

The city boasts what it calls "the most compact venue concept," which is clustered around a \$1.5 billion new resort complex called Alpensia. Venues for ski jump, biathlon and cross country skiing have just been built.

All of the venues are within 30 minutes of each other.

Cho said that 90 percent of Koreans support the bid and he is confident the region will become a new winter sports center. Officials emphasized that despite losing twice, they kept the promises they made. Kim said PyeongChang learned that the Winter Olympics must be athletecentered and leave a legacy.

He also said a winning bid would symbolically unify the people of North and South Korea.

#### Munich Wants to Host "Friendly Games"

Munich, which hosted the 1972 Summer Olympics, is trying to become the first city to host both the Summer and Winter Games.

"We have a clear vision," said Munich CEO Willy Bogner. "We'd like to make it the Friendly Games. First and foremost friendly to all athletes, we will provide them with excellent venues."

The "ice cluster" will be in Munich, the "snow cluster" in Garmisch-Partenkirchen and the sliding center in Koenigssee, 160km distant.

Bogner was joined by Thomas Bach, President of the German Olympic Sports Confederation and Vice President of the IOC; Munich Lord Mayor Christian Ude; Dr. Thomas de Maizière, Federal Minister of the Interior; Siegfried Schneider, Bavaria's State Minister and two-time Olympic figure skating gold medalist Katarina Witt, who is Chair of Munich 2018.

German IOC member Claudia Bokel was also in the audience.

Bogner said the distance between

Munich and Garmisch-Partenkirchen is only one hour (90km) and could be even faster in 2018.

Ude said Munich has learned from the massacre at the 1972 Olympics in which terrorists killed 11 Israeli athletes and coaches.



He said that since the tragedy, Munich has hosted more than 10,000 big events in the Olympic park without any security problems. "That's a reason why we think we can deliver security and can make safe Games," he said.

de Maizière added, "We learned the lesson and history never repeats."

Munich must build only three venues.

Munich believes one of its strengths is that it has organized more than a dozen World Championships in Olympic sports in the past four years and will host the alpine skiing world championships at Garmisch in 2011.

The Olympics would also be used to renew the Munich Olympic Park as a great center of sports for future generations, says the bid. +

The publisher so far leads the editor 20.25km to 7.14km in the contest for the medal in Olympic walking.


"I've never even been close to winning a medal in anything athletic," the publisher said. "I'm determined that

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
