## **Message** from the Director General



Dear colleagues,

It is my pleasure to introduce this month's newsletter with a report on the Airport Excellence (APEX) in Safety

programme. ACI World and ACI Africa launched the programme with a Safety Seminar that drew over 180 delegates and an excellent roster of speakers, including ICAO from both the global and regional offices. Graciously and generously hosted in Marrakech by the Moroccan Airports Authority (ONDA), airport and civil aviation authority representatives heard from experts in runway safety, wildlife hazard mitigation, safety management systems and safety culture as well as insights on the use of technology to improve airport safety. In addition, as part of the APEX in Safety promise, guidance material and a toolkit were distributed to all participants. And, as further encouragement, 20 participants were lucky winners of ACI online safety training courses, free of charge.

We announced the first pilot airport for the APEX in Safety programme, Lome Toko in Togo. We are working on an agreement between ACI and the global and regional offices of ICAO to work together with all of the aviation stakeholders in the country to make a difference. The airport authority (SALT) has already assembled these stakeholders in a safety management development programme and will now have the combined forces of ICAO and ACI to assist the effort. The ACI Fund Council has approved development of a special ACI Fund seminar for Togo to contribute to the effort.

Our next regional safety event will be in the Latin America-Caribbean region in June, in conjunction with ICAO and Latin American and Caribbean Air Transport Association - ALTA. The regional safety committee has already set targets for the priority challenges it intends to tackle for its APEX in Safety programme.

We are off to a strong start.

I also want to offer thanks for the generous contributions received so far for the Humanitarian Relief Fund that provides support to airport employees affected by the tragic events in Christchurch and Japan. For those that wish to contribute, the link is on the ACI World, North America and Asia Pacific websites. The fund is managed by the U.S.-based American Association of Airport Executives.

The 3rd meeting of the ACI World Airport IT Standing Committee (WAITSC) took place in Stockholm, Sweden, 24-25 March 2011, hosted by Swedavia, with an excellent participation of more than 30 airport delegates and industry representatives – including representation from IATA and the airline community – which is the best attendance the Committee has had to date.

- Indoor geo-positioning, geo-localization and augmented reality

The meeting was considered to be one of the most productive and successful ones by Committee members, given the issues addressed, the level of the discussions, and the promising outcomes achieved.

#### IATA's Passenger Experience Management Group (PEMG) 4th meeting in London LHR

The IATA's PEMG and related Working Groups met in London, 14-18 March 2011, at BAA premises in Heathrow, hosted by BAA, with the participation of ACI World staff and 8 airport representatives.

The PEMG was founded in 2010 as part of a coordinated approach to improve the passenger experience by cross-industry collaboration, involving all stakeholders – airlines, airports, government agencies and service providers – in the decision making process.

ACI World Governing Board issues statement ∽⊕

#### Preliminary World Airport Traffic 2010 Passenger traffic up 6.3%; Cargo up 15.2%

ACI preliminary traffic results, based on reports from over 900 airports worldwide, indicate that global passenger traffic grew at a better than expected rate of 6.3 percent and cargo rose strongly by 15.2 percent, as compared to 2009. Aircraft movements remained stable at just under 1 percent.

ACI World Director General Angela Gittens comments, "2010 underscored the resilience of the air transport business and resulted in over 5 billion annual passengers for the first time ever. 2010 also pronounced the shift and divergence in growth across the regions. While North America and Europe have struggled to reach pre-crisis passenger volumes, Asia-Pacific, Latin America-Caribbean and Middle East sustained a strong momentum and gained market share through double digit growth."

Monthly passenger growth worldwide in 2010 was consistently high between 5 percent and 10 percent with the exception of a significant setback in April due to the volcanic ash cloud that hit Europe particularly hard. Another anomaly impacting traffic mainly in Europe was the unusually harsh winter weather in December. Despite these setbacks Europe still registered growth of 4.3 percent in 2010 thanks to strong international summer and fall traffic.

A slow economic recovery and restraint of air carriers in adding domestic capacity has led to modest growth in North America of 2.4 percent keeping passenger numbers below pre-crisis levels in that region.

Asia-Pacific has benefited from a 14.2 percent rise of international passengers resulting in a total increase of 11.5 percent. Latin AmericaCaribbean enjoyed strong domestic traffic growth particularly in Brazil and other Latin American countries as national economies and low cost carriers expand quickly.

International traffic was also important in Africa which registered 8.8 percent more passengers in total while 11.5 percent more passengers arrived and departed in the Middle East.

The recovery was more coherent and comprehensive in the freight sector where all regions showed a robust double digit increase led by Asia-Pacific (+18.6%) and Europe (+17%). International freight was the driver of the air freight recovery as total tonnage jumped by 20.5 percent compared to 2009.

Aircraft movements increased the most in Latin America-Caribbean (+6.2%), Middle East (+6.1%) and Asia-Pacific (+5%) while movements continued to decline in Europe (-0.4%) and North America (-1.2%).

Gittens concludes, "Passenger and freight growth clearly surpassed global GDP growth in 2010. GDP growth projections for this and the coming years are high creating a positive outlook for demand for air transport. This underpins the need to continue to expand and modernize airport infrastructure to maintain high standards of efficiency and customer service. More than ever, airports will be asked to finance these projects autonomously without public funds requiring private and public airports to be empowered to generate necessary returns on their investment."

#### Airport ranking

Among the largest airports in the world Beijing (+13%) leaped to the second rank eyeing Atlanta (+1.5%) which continues to be the world's largest airport. London Heathrow dropped to the fourth rank overtaken by Beijing and Chicago O'Hare

(+3.3%). Only two airports in the top 30 did not grow in 2010, Las Vegas (-2.6%) and London Heathrow (-0.2%). Charlotte (+10.4%) was the only large airport outside Asia-Pacific and Middle East growing by more than 10 percent. See tables 1, 2, 3.

### PaxFlash and FreightFlash February 2010

#### **Global traffic rises moderately in February** - *Results for Africa plummet by 21%*

Global passenger traffic at airports grew by almost 4 percent in February, with international up by 4.5 and domestic by 3.4 percent. Freight volumes stagnated for the month reflecting a decrease of 3.3 percent in domestic freight traffic.

North African airports were heavily hit by political unrest in Egypt and Tunisia resulting in 21 percent decline in the Africa region, with drastic reductions seen for Cairo (-54%), Sharm El Sheikh (-71%), Tunis (-31%). Bahrain also

recorded implications of the social unrest with a 15% passenger decline. The drop of tourismrelated traffic in North Africa travel seems to have boosted results at other leisure destinations, benefiting particularly alternative destinations in Spain and Turkey. Sharp growth was reported by Fuerteventura (+34%), Sevilla (+20%), Tenerife (+13%), Lanzarote and Gran Canaria (+11%) and Antalya (+20%).

Overall, February saw further consolidation of growth. In light of 6.8 percent growth during the reference period one year ago, the 3.9 percent global growth this February, despite the Africa decrease, remains positive. Asia Pacific, Europe, Latin America-Caribbean and the Middle East show homogeneous growth rates between 5 and 6 percent whereas North America's passenger figures expanded by 2.8 percent. International traffic grew faster than domestic in North America (+3.4%), Europe (+6.1%) and Asia Pacific (+7.7%). The rolling 12 months figure (see Table 1) remains high at 6.4% just slightly below the peak of 6.9% reached in January.

One third of airports in the PaxFlash sample reported negative growth for February, a comparatively high proportion mainly tied to decreases seen at North African airports that would normally have risen during this tourism period.

ACI Director Economics Andreas Schimm comments, "The impact of the social and political crisis in North Africa on overall global traffic is limited, yet for the individual airports that were accustomed to rapid growth, it represents a very severe situation as both aeronautical and nonaeronautical revenues plunge.

"While the situation in North Africa remains fragile with the focus shifting to Libya, the effects of the natural and nuclear disaster in Japan that occurred in March will have a far bigger impact on March results both in the Asia-Pacific region as well as depressing global passenger numbers." The freight situation is more sobering as there was no growth in February globally. The stagnation comes relative to a 22 percent increase in the reference period February 2010. Asia Pacific and the Middle East recorded declines of 3.4 and 9.3 percent respectively. While the drop seen in Asia Pacific was mostly caused by domestic freight decreases, Middle East freight is international only. Globally, however, international freight continued to expand by 1.6 percent.

Schimm adds, "It would be misleading to interpret these figures as a precursor to a cooling world economy. Growth rates were exceptionally high during the first half of the 2010 reference period, and the situation is already positive if the volumes reached then can be upheld."

## New retail, food & beverage benchmark survey to be launched

Based on the requests from several ASQ airports, a new dedicated benchmark survey focusing exclusively on retail and F&B activities will be launched in October 2011. The survey will focus on the three most important commercial services (food & beverage, non duty free retail and duty free retail), helping airports improve their retail performance in each of these areas. By providing a global benchmark of retail activities, participating airports will be able to put their performance into perspective and identify best practices in commercial service management.

The survey will help airports:

- Evaluate passenger satisfaction with retail services & identify which aspects of service have the highest impact on passenger satisfaction
- Compare their sales performance with other airports (share of impulse spending, total passenger spend, etc...)
- Identify their consumer profiles and understand purchasing behaviours

The new retail survey will follow a common methodology in all airports and will benefit from synergies and compatibilities with the ASQ Survey. Passengers will be interviewed at the gate in two annual waves. These will cover both the winter and summer schedules in order to understand seasonal changes in the passenger mix. A first wave will be performed in October 2011 in order to provide results before the end of the year.

#### **2010 ASQ Awards recognize the world's best airports**

The spectacular Kingdom of Dreams in New Delhi, India played host to this year's ASQ Awards which recognized the world's best airports according to ACI's ASQ passenger satisfaction survey. For the sixth year in a row, Incheon International airport was named Best Airport Worldwide, with Singapore Changi Airport and Hong Kong International Airport placing second and third respectively. In total 46 Awards were handed out during the event, recognizing the top airports in each of the categories - worldwide, by size, by region, best regional airport and best improvement.

The annual ASQ Awards are the world's benchmark measure of service excellence. They represent the highest possible accolade for airport operators and are an opportunity to celebrate the commitment of airports worldwide to continuously improve the passenger experience. The ASQ Awards are the only global airport rankings to be based on a measure of the passengers' satisfaction taken while the passenger is still at the gate. In 2010, over 300,000 passengers were interviewed prior to boarding their flight and asked to rate their satisfaction with the airport that day.

The ASQ Survey is the world's leading airport passenger satisfaction benchmark programme. Its scientific methodology, strict quality control procedures and commitment to impartiality have won industry recognition and established it as the global standard for measuring passenger satisfaction. Every month, at all participating airports, departing passengers are interviewed at the gate while the experience is fresh in their minds. All airports use the same questionnaire (available in over 30 languages) and follow the same methodology. Customer feedback is measured on a range of service delivery parameters that track the customer experience from the moment of arrival at the airport to the departure gate. Each participating airport receives the data from all other participants allowing it to identify best practice and to measure its own performance precisely. By providing a global benchmark of passenger satisfaction, ASQ enables airports to see where they stand relative to their peers



### Airport Spotlight

## Tuned to the beat of airports worldwide

Bucharest Henri Coandã International Airport – the gateway airport to Romania, inaugurated their new finger terminal on 29 March, 2011. Construction of the terminal with an aerial design representing a viola began in August 2009 at a cost of Euros 60 million. This is the third stage of an investment programme which targets an increase in passenger processing capacity from 4.5 million passengers to 6 million passengers per year with this new facility.



Bucharest Airports National Company (BANC), operating two airports in Romania, is a young company running at full speed on its pathway of development and modernization. The terminals' modern architectural concept, high-tech equipment and upgraded functionality, provides passengers with a new definition of comfort, and improvements in security and aeronautical safety to adjust to the specific requirements of the constantly increasing traffic.

The 16,600 m<sup>2</sup> terminal was designed to meet Class B service quality criteria and incorporating the requirements for Romania to be accepted into the Schengen zone. This is a new milestone which defines the identity of our company.

## **ACI Global Training**

#### Next Generation of Aviation Professionals (NGAP) Update

ACI has been actively supporting the Next Generation of Aviation Professionals (NGAP) Task Force since its inception. At the third meeting from 7 - 10 February 2011, it was clear that the work of the different sub-groups of the task force is progressing well:

- The flight crew group reviewed a competency framework for instructors and evaluators and started work on developing command competencies.
- The air traffic management group started the development of competency frameworks for air traffic controllers and air traffic services electronics personnel (ATSEPs).
- The accreditation group discussed the similarities and differences of systems to accredit aviation university-degree granting programmes.

Participants also heard about the activities of the outreach group including the NGAP website which can be accessed from www.icao.int - and the series of ICAO NGAP Regional Conferences. In fact, ACI was represented during the very successful first ICAO NGAP Regional Conference conducted in Incheon, Republic of Korea from 30 March to 1 April.

In addition, a case was made for the development of guidance material related to the airport professionals through the NGAP Task Force. ICAO agreed to facilitate this work provided that a sub-group including all stakeholders (association, service providers, industry, regulators, training and education providers, etc.) could be brought to task on this issue. This sub-group, once established, could eventually develop competency frameworks for airport professionals.

#### ACI Global Training supports APEX initiatives and donates 60 e-learning courses to developing nations' airports

ACI has launched the ACI Airport Excellence in Safety (APEX) initiative, a new safety advancement initiative that will ensure that airports contribute proactively to the demands of a safe and secure air transport system. As a part of the ACI Airport Excellence in Safety (APEX) initiative, ACI Africa / ACI World have organized a Safety Seminar, in broad cooperation with ICAO, which has established a special safety programme for Africa.

The ACI Global Training segment in collaboration with ACI Africa is pleased to launch its safety awareness online programmes in support of this initiative within the region. As such, ACI will be donating sixty (60) "Safety Management Systems Awareness Online Training" licenses which are contributed through the Developing Nations ACI Training - DNA Training® programme, free of cost to gualified candidates. This programme will allow candidates from Developing Nations' airports to be given access to an online certification programme, whom after successful completion of the online training will receive an e-certificate.

In addition, ACI Global Training provides specialized safety courses with its Global Safety Network (GSN) Diploma that brings all the knowledge and tools to airport professionals to succeed in their position. In addition to a large number of face-to-face safety courses, ACI continues to increase its online curriculum, to enable airports to reduce their costs and manage their time more efficiently.
