ACI World is off to a great start in this New Year, with the first stages of our move to Montreal going smoothly and many new activities for

members planned throughout the year.

Our first World event will be the popular Trinity Forum in Bangkok, jointly organized with The Moodie Report. An outstanding speaker selection is drawing strong attendance for this retail and revenue-centric conference, so I hope to see high levels of airport participation to interact with our global retail and brand partners.

In March 2011 we will welcome the ACI Economics and Finance Conference in London, jointed organized by ACI World and ACI Europe. ACI supports ATAG Industry Participation at UNFCCC Cancun Meeting

The United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) met in Cancun Mexico late in 2010. It is planned that international aviation ("bunker") fuels will be included in any new post-Kyoto climate agreement, so there is plenty at stake for the aviation industry.

ACI participated in the ATAG delegation at Cancun with industry partners including IATA, CANSO and aircraft manufacturers, promoting the united aviation industry position on addressing aviation fuel emissions through a global sectoral approach under ICAO, including global efficiency targets, a 2020 carbon neutral growth goal and a long term emissions reduction goal. The delegation monitored developments, informed national delegates of industry positions and actions, and held several side events on technology, infrastructure, operations and biofuels.

The Cancun meeting did not (as expected) result in a binding agreement, so no decisions were made on how to address international aviation. Although small, enough progress was made to restore some faith in the UNFCCC process and avoid the collapse of the talks altogether.

For aviation, two important threats were averted. The first was the possibility that responsibility for addressing emissions from international aviation would be moved from ICAO back to the UNFCCC. However, ICAO gained strong support from member States to continue to its efforts. The second potential adverse outcome is the introduction of new taxes on aviation that would be used to raise funds for adaptation to climate change. While such proposals are not currently proceeding, the possibilities remain and the industry and ICAO must continue to resist such inappropriate measures.



Common Agreement Document -Boeing 747-8 Airport Compatibility Group - (BACG)

ACI and Boeing have just published the document in December 2010, following its endorsement by five CAAs (Australia, France, Germany, Italy and the Netherlands) as appropriate guidance. The recommendation letter was signed by ACI Director General Angela Gittens and Boeing Vice-President Flight Services Sherry Carbary. This publication is timely, since the B747-8's entry

into service is expected in 2011. ACI and Boeing expect that many other CAAs will regard it as a suitable basis for planning for the introduction of the Boeing 747-8 at existing airports.

The BACG group was set up in 2007, and was convened and chaired by ACI (represented by David Gamper, Director of Safety and Technical Affairs), with Boeing acting as secretary. Other members were from Civil Aviation Authorities (CAAs), airports, IATA and Cargolux, the planned first operator. The BACG group produced the draft "Common Agreement Document" of the BACG in November 2008. Since then, CAAs have undertaken internal approval processes, which have necessarily taken some time.

The Boeing 747-8 is a development of the 747-400 with a fuselage stretch and wingtip extensions, and although it is classified as an ICAO Code F aircraft, its wingspan exceeds the limit of Code E by less than 4 metres. The freighter, which will be the first version to be introduced (operated by Cargolux) will travel to a large number of airports, and it is important that all these airports (which are mostly ICAO Code E) should be able to accommodate it with the least possible modifications whilst meeting all safety requirements.


According to the BACG, it is not necessary for airports receiving the 747-8 to be modified to meet the full ICAO Code F design standards. The mitigations developed in the BACG Agreement are acceptable for existing Code E airports, however, for extensions of existing airports and for new airports, CAAs may still wish to see the full Code F standards implemented.

The BACG document sets out operational requirements for airports, and allows for mitigations based on the characteristics and performance of the aircraft. The document notes that "the operational guidelines developed for

the 747-8 are recommendations proposed by an informal group. It is stressed that the authority to approve any deviation from ICAO Annex 14 specifications shall rest solely with the state having jurisdiction over the aerodrome."

747-8. which 747-8 includes Intercontinental and the 747-8 Freighter, was launched in November 2005. According to Boeing's website, there are 109 orders for the 747-8: 33 for the 747-8 Intercontinental and 76 for the 747-8 Freighter. The first 747-8 Freighter is scheduled to be delivered in mid 2011, and the Intercontinental version later in 2011. Eighteen feet longer than the 747-400, the 747-8 Intercontinental has 51 additional seats to accommodate 467 passengers in a typical threeclass configuration, and it also offers 26 percent more cargo volume.

Nominations are invited from airport management professionals who are interested in serving as a 'Member at Large' on the ACI World Facilitation & Services Standing Committee.

The Facilitation and Services Standing Committee covers the following issues:

- facilitation of passengers and their baggage, freight and mail;
- quality of service at airports (standards and measurement);
- automated services for passengers and baggage, freight and mail;
- use of information technology, automated systems and telecommunications to support business and operational processes at airports;
- surface access to airports and intermodal issues:
- measures to combat drug trafficking;
- slot allocation and schedule coordination and the interrelationship between facilitation and security.

The Committee's role is to assist ACI World and to:

- Monitor industry developments and trends and their implications on airports;
- Advise on strategic, policy and technical issues, and help formulate industry positions;
- Help define industry best practice and standards;

- Advise on the need and assist in the development of industry benchmark surveys, analysis and reports; and
- Advise on the Facilitation and Customer Service training and development needs of airports.

The Committee meets, on average, once every 8 months and has monthly webinars / conference calls. The next meeting is a joint meeting with the World Security Standing Committee in Sydney, Australia on 1-2 March, 2011.

As a Member-at-Large, you would normally serve for a period of 3 years.

PaxFlash and FreightFlash November 2010

November global passenger traffic up by 7% Robust growth to yield best year ever

Airport participants in the ACI PaxFlash and FreightFlash monthly traffic reporting exercise have indicated that passenger and freight traffic continued to rise in November 2010. Total passenger traffic increased by 6.9 percent compared to November 2009, with international traffic up by 8.1 percent and domestic by 6 percent. For the first eleven months of 2010, world passenger traffic increased by 6.5 percent, international traffic growing by 7.7 percent and domestic traffic by 5.5 percent.

Director General Angela Gittens comments, "November reporting indicates that 2010 will set a new record for global airport industry traffic with total passenger growth near 7 percent. Within that overall increase there are marked regional differences. While the Asia Pacific, Middle East and Latin America-Caribbean regions surged well beyond pre-crisis passenger volumes, Europe and North America lag behind previous peak performance. Nonetheless, Europe appears to be on track to becoming the largest traffic region in 2010 for the first time ever, moving ahead of the North America market. It remains to be seen how significantly the harsh winter weather will affect December traffic results."

Freight traffic growth is still slowing relative to its rapid rebound in the first half of 2010. Comparing November 2010 to November 2009, total freight increased by 4.3 percent, international freight rose by 5.3 percent and domestic freight by 1.3 percent. Year to date in 2010, global freight growth reaches 18.2 percent, with international freight at 23.4 percent and domestic freight at 9 percent for the 11-month period.

Gittens comments, "Freight growth was exceptional in 2010 and despite a marked slowdown in the second semester, the overall increase of close to 18 percent more than compensates for the 8 percent drop in 2009. The divergence among the regions is less pronounced than in the passenger sector, as all regions enjoyed double digit growth earlier in the year."

Passenger traffic

Russia, India, Egypt, Brazil, South Korea, United Arab Emirates contributed most significantly to a global 6.5 percent increase in passengers worldwide. Individual airports outside of these countries that had a favourable impact on passenger numbers worldwide were Shanghai Hongqiao (+24.5%), Barcelona (+15%), Boston (+13%), Amsterdam (+11%), Munich (+11%), Kuala Lumpur (+10.5%), New York/ LGA (+10%), Istanbul Ataturk (+12.5%), Manila (+16.5%).

The worldwide growth average was slightly dampened by results reported from Athens (-9.5%), Mexico City (-9.5%), London Stansted (-7.5%), and Tokyo Narita (-6). Overall, however, only 15 percent of airports in the sample registered a decrease in passengers.

Domestic traffic was strong in China, India, Brazil, Turkey and the US. For international traffic results, Mexico City (-22%) and Tokyo Narita (-7.5%) suffered the largest declines, while Muscat (29.5%), Moscow Sheremetyevo (+24%), Cairo (+23%), Barcelona (+20%), Incheon (+20%), Dubai (+16%) gained significant international traffic.

Regional passenger traffic growth ranged between 5 percent (North America and Latin America -Caribbean) and 13 percent (Middle East). Africa grew by 10.3 percent, Asia Pacific by 8.2 percent and Europe by 6.9 percent. Growth in Africa was driven by Egypt, Tunisia and South Africa strongly characterized by international leisure travel. In Asia Pacific, the largest market China has slowed to single digit growth, which is the slowest growth rate in the region since July 2009. Europe benefits from very robust growth in Russia and Turkey. North America results are pushed by domestic carrier competition especially on the East Coast, whereas Latin America-Caribbean results were dragged down by traffic drops in Mexico where the security situation weighs on demand for inbound travel.

Freight traffic

Freight growth has been slowing down considerably since mid year. In November total freight volumes grew by 4.3 percent, the slowest growth since October 2009. To put that figure in perspective, however, it must be noted that these results compare with November 2009 which already saw a healthy 11 percent post-crisis increase.

Overall growth was lifted by 8 percent growth in Europe and 7.5 percent growth in international freight in North America making these two regions the fastest growing in November. The hitherto very robustly growing regions Middle East, Latin America and Asia Pacific are in consolidation mode as their freight volumes surged during the reference period at the end of 2009.

Growth stagnated in Singapore and Dubai, while Shanghai Pudong (-2%) and Incheon (-1%) registered negative growth. A number of US and European airports showed robust growth.







AMPAP now recognizes World Business Partners, ACI-ICAO personnel and CAA officials worldwide Sarah Samuel, SITA's Account Director, Airports, North Pacific and

SITA's Account Director, Airports, North Pacific and Asia, completed the fourth and final AMPAP mandatory course in November

2010, becoming the first person to earn the AMPAP Associate Diploma.

The ACI-ICAO AMPAP Steering Committee created this diploma in mid-2010 to recognize and reward industry stakeholders for their efforts and commitment. Eligible persons for this Associate Diploma include ACI World Business Partners, personnel from ACI and ICAO, and employees of civil aviation authorities worldwide who are required to complete the four core mandatory courses. (The AMPAP International Airport Professional IAP accreditation is reserved for management personnel currently working for commercial airports and is a six-course curriculum).

Upon receiving her diploma, Ms. Samuel remarked: "I have been working in Aviation IT for about 15 years now. AMPAP has been a great vehicle to broaden my perspective and enhance my appreciation of the full spectrum of the aviation world. It has helped me understand my clients' world better and to be able to address their concerns and needs and work with my organization to develop innovative solutions. It is an honour to be part of the professional AMPAP Community."

Dr. Pierre Coutu, AMPAP Programme Executive, explained the rationale behind the Associate Diploma as follows: "While AMPAP was designed originally for airport-management personnel only, ACI and ICAO quickly became aware of the value of the programme for other stakeholders in our complex and highly interdependent industry. Participants such as Ms. Samuel bring a wealth of experience to the programme and have played a valuable role in virtually every mandatory course we've offered, both in-class and on-line. These stakeholders, while ineligible for the IAP, nonetheless deserve a meaningful award for their efforts and contribution - we believe this AMPAP Associate Diploma addresses that issue, and that it will become a prestigious designation in its own right. Over 40 aviation stakeholders are currently active in AMPAP and we anticipate awarding the Associate Diploma to many more candidates in the years ahead. In fact, three others in the last month have qualified for this diploma, including the first ICAO recipient, Lia Ricalde, Regional Officer, Aerodromes and Visual Aids. If a Diploma holder should move to an airport management position, he or she is immediately eligible to earn the IAP accreditation by completing two elective courses."
