## Montpelier Addresses a Washington, DC, Club

The General Henry Knox Museum, largely through the efforts of vice chair Molly Kellogg, was able to reach a broad audience in the Washington, DC, area in early March. George Washington's Mount Vernon and the Society of the Cincinnati are co-sponsoring a new exhibition, George Washington and His Generals, for which they have borrowed Henry Knox's Society of the Cincinnati medal from The General Henry Knox Museum's collections. To celebrate the exhibition opening, on March 4th all three organizations were invited to speak to a crowd of about a hundred at the Sulgrave Club, a prominent women's club formed for literary, musical, artistic and social purposes.

In the days following, board chair Patrick Cardon, vice chair Molly Kellogg, executive director Douglas Winterich and director of education Ellen Dyer visited the exhibition at Mount Vernon's new Reynolds Education Center, met with Congresswoman Chellie Pingree and Senator Olympia Snowe's offices, paid visits to their colleagues at Dumbarton House, the National Archives and the Society of the Cincinnati's Anderson House, met with museum supporters at a dinner hosted by board member Holly Boyd Ruffin, and enjoyed a wonderful lunch at the home of museum supporter Doris Buffett.

#### Bob Schieffer, CBS News chief Washington Correspondent, to be Guest Speaker and Gala Honoree

Veteran journalist Bob Schieffer, marking 40 years with CBS News, is The General Henry Knox Museum's guest speaker and Gala honoree this year. He will make a public presentation 6 p.m., Thursday, August 6, at The Strand Theatre in Rockland, and will speak and be honored at a 7:30 p.m. Gala reception and dinner to follow at Camden National Bank's historic Spear Block location in Rockland.

Schieffer will speak at The Strand about his 52-year career in journalism, including his role as moderator of "Face the Nation" since 1991 and his coverage of national politics. He will then answer questions from the audience. In addition, he will speak about and sign copies of his new book, *Bob Schieffer's America*.

Schieffer has covered all four major beats in the nation's capital—the White House, the Pentagon, the State Department and Capitol Hill. He has been Chief Washington correspondent since 1982 and congressional correspondent since 1989 and has covered every presidential campaign and been a floor reporter at all the Democratic and Republican National Conventions since 1972.

Schieffer had planned to retire in 2008. Instead, he published his third book, moderated the final debate of the 2008 campaign, received an Emmy for lifetime achievement, was recipient of the Leonard Zeidenberg First Amendment Award by the Radio-Television News Directors Association, was named a "Living Legend" by the Library of Congress, and, with his

country music band Honky Tonk Confidential, made his debut at the Grand Ole Opry.

"It was some kind of year," Schieffer said.
"When I told my boss, Sean McManus, president of CBS News and Sports, that I wanted to retire, he said, 'Don't you want to stick around to see one more campaign?' It was the best advice I ever got; I wouldn't have missed it for the world." Schieffer, who had also moderated the final presidential debate in 2004, received widespread praise for his handling of the third and final 2008 debate.

The museum's Development Committee has made arrangements for Schieffer's appearance. Previous honorees are Cokie Roberts in 2008, Brian Lamb in 2007 and David McCullough in 2006.

Proceeds from both The Strand event and the Gala will benefit the museum's education and preservation programs. Tickets for The Strand—\$35 general admission, \$25 members—will go on sale June 30. For more information, call (207) 354-0858.

## Revolution and Evolution: Historic Costume Exhibition at Montpelier July 13-August 22

Mary Doering, history of decorative arts faculty member at Corcoran College of Art and Design and private collector of eighteenth century clothing, will be a guest curator at The General Henry Knox Museum. An exhibition of highlights from her collection, which was praised by *Arts and Antiques* magazine as one of the top

private collections in the United States, will be on display throughout the mansion from July 13-August 22. The exhibition opens with a 7 p.m. talk by Ms. Doering on Monday, July 13, before which attendees will be free to peruse the exhibition. Thereafter, the exhibition may be seen during two specialized tours led by local costume historian Julie Stackpole, on Saturday, July 25 at 1 p.m. and again on Friday, August 21st at 10 a.m., or during the museum's regular tours. The cost of the opening talk is \$15 for museum members, \$20 for general admission, and the specialized tours are \$5 for museum members and \$10 for general admission. Advanced registration is necessary for the specialized tours. This exhibition is being held in conjunction with the museum's summer teacher institute, Exploring Early American History—Everyday Life. #### The General Henry Knox Museum Works on Museum Assessment Program, Public Dimension Assessment

The General Henry Knox Museum was selected to participate in the Museum Assessment Program (MAP) of the American Association of Museums (AAM) and the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). The General Henry Knox Museum will take part in a public dimension assessment, which considers the public's perception, experience and involvement with the museum. The assessment will assist the museum in effectively communicating with the public and help the museum identify and strengthen collaborations with other organizations around the country. It includes a review of all the ways in which the museum interacts with its audiences, including marketing, public relations, audiences development, and exhibitions.

Since November 2008 12 people from throughout The General Henry Knox Museum family have been working on the Museum Assessment Program's Public Dimension Assessment. Eight members of the MAP team are museum volunteers, who have dedicated several months to meeting, completing the self-study workbook, and creating several public involvement activities, including a focus group and an informal canvassing of public perception about the museum. Once the resulting data is compiled, the team will submit the results to an AAM approved consultant, who will suggest ways in which the museum can better serve and get its message out to the public.

Your help and feedback may be solicited as part of the MAP assessment and will be an important part of identifying the museum's strengths and weaknesses, opportunities and challenges.

#### Everyday Life in Early American History the Subject of Summer Teacher Institute

July 13–17 and 20–24, The General Henry Knox Museum's Center for the Study of Early American History will explore everyday life in 18th- and early 19th-century America. The program, which will welcome teachers from all over the Northeast and beyond, will examine how early Americans lived, worked and interacted. Participants will partake in a mix of classroom lectures, hands-on activities and field trips. And this year the Museum will present a historic costume exhibition in conjunction with the institute, curated by private collector Mary Doering (see page 2, Revolution and Evolution, for more details).

Public speakers during this year's institute include Mary Doering, opening the costume exhibition; Richard Shenkman, editor of the History News Network and author of such books as I Love Paul Revere Whether He Rode or Not and One Night Stands with American History; Dr. Elizabeth Johns, professor emerita at the University of Pennsylvania and author of American Genre Painting: The Politics of Everyday Life; and Dr. James Kirby Martin, author of Drinking in America. #### The Henry Knox Reading Circle

Since the fall edition of *The Cannon* the Reading Circle has studied: James Madison and The Struggle for The Bill Of Rights

(Richard Labunski); Liberty Without Anarchy (Minor Myers); and Six Frigates (Ian W. Toll). Several readings, pausing for pondering, are necessary to comprehend the finesse of Madison's nurturing of The Bill Of Rights. But even single exposure conveys the patient subtlety, hard work capacity and disciplines (practically invisible) ego of the future 4th president. Much is owed to him.

Members who read Minor Myer's book reported favorably and especially valued the connection with our own Henry Knox. Extraneous disapproval of The Society of The Cincinnati erupts periodically, apparently because membership passes to descendents and thereby "creates an aristocracy." Well, right of association is a constituent of liberty. One expects, too, that The Cincinnati is among the guardians of American history and liberty.

Six Frigates is rich in anecdotes, characters and scenarios that augment history rendered by others for 1775-1814. Author Ian Toll forces one from the library to the shipyard, quarter and gun decks and the oak and pine groves of southeastern states. Naval architect Joshua Humphreys of Philadelphia is a fascinating character. Irascible, opinionated, cantankerous. He was the father of those six frigates with live oak scantlings that so amazed and upset the Royal Navy.

Commencing in March, our new study will be Abraham Lincoln. Any book!

### The Knox Museum Joins Evacuation Day Celebration

The General Henry Knox Museum participated on March 14th in the Evacuation Day celebration in Roxbury, Massachusetts. Arranged every year by the South Boston Citizens' Association's Michael Bare to commemorate the British evacuating Boston on March 17, 1776, this year's celebration took place at Fort Hill in Roxbury followed by a ceremony and reception at the Dillaway-Thomas House. Henry Knox was prominent in the day's proceedings: He designed the defenses on Fort Hill, the project in which Knox's talent first caught George Washington's eye; the ceremony at the Dillaway-Thomas House included the dedication of a new Knox Trail marker, identifying one of the final legs of Knox's journey with his noble train of artillery from Fort Ticonderoga to north of Boston; and the reason for the celebration, Evacuation Day, was made possible by those 59 cannon Knox was able to deliver successfully to General Washington. Other groups participating in the events included the Roxbury Heritage State Park, Discover Roxbury, and the Massachusetts Society of the Cincinnati.

#### 2008 Annual Holiday Open House

The General Henry Knox Museum celebrated their annual Holiday Open House on Saturday and Sunday, December 6th and 7th. The two-day event drew more than 515 visitors who enjoyed listening to musical performances in the Oval Room. The museum gift shop did a brisk business as visitors began their holiday shopping. The holiday punch and cookies as well as the baked foods table were never without a crowd of family and friends.

#### In Memory/Memorials

Holland "Holly" Coors, a strong supporter of The General Henry Knox Museum through the Castle Rock Foundation, died January 18, 2009, in Golden, Colorado. During her last visit to Montpelier in 2003, she attended a luncheon at the home of Board member Molly Kellogg.

Dr. James Thomas Williams, died February 4, 2009, in New Orleans, Lousiana. Dr. Williams was a native of Picayune MS. He was an orthopedic surgeon and philanthropist. In 1999 he retired to spend more time at his beloved home in Spruce Head, Maine where he and his wife Anne became avid supporters and volunteers at Montpelier. His wife has asked that memorial donations may be made to the Landscape Garden Fund at Montpelier.

Andrew Newell Wyeth, 1917–2009 Andrew Wyeth, a Life member of The General Henry Knox Museum, died January 16, 2009, in Chadds Ford, Pennsylvania. He was the youngest of the five children of illustrator and artist N. C. (Newall Convers) Wyeth and his wife, Carolyn Bockius Wyeth. He was the brother of inventor Nathaniel Wyeth and artist Henriette Wyeth Hurd. He was home-tutored and learned art from his father, who was also responsible for his son's love of rural landscapes, sense of romance, and a feeling for Wyeth family history. He and his wife Betsy have had a major impact on cultural institutions in the mid-coast areas.
