

2012 BIG EAST Preseason Honors

PROVIDENCE, R.I. – Notre Dame and Marquette were picked as favorites in the 2012 BIG EAST preseason women's soccer poll. The Irish were chosen to win the league's National Division with 12 first-place votes, while the Golden Eagles had 13 first-place votes and sit atop the American Division in the poll. Each team advanced to the NCAA tournament last year and returns an All-BIG EAST Preseason Team member. The votes were cast by the league's 15 head coaches, who were not permitted to vote for their own teams.

Notre Dame totaled 109 points and has been picked first in each of the last 17 years dating to 1995, when it joined the BIG EAST. Junior Mandy Laddish was named to the All-BIG EAST Preseason Team. She played in all 21 games for the Irish last season and was an All-BIG EAST Second Team selection. Recently she was named to the United States Under-20 National Team and will head to Japan to compete in the U-20 World Cup. The Irish went 10-8-3 (6-3-2 BIG EAST) last season.

Headlining the American Division was **Marquette** with 97 points. The Golden Eagles (18-4, 10-1 BIG EAST) won the regular-season title last year and made their fourth straight appearance in the NCAA tournament. Senior Ally Miller is the league's Preseason Defensive Player of the Year and a member of the Preseason All-BIG EAST Team. She helped anchor one of the league's top defenses last year allowing just seven goals in 11 conference games for a 0.63 goalsagainst average. Outside league play, Marquette totaled a league-best 13 shutouts.

Junior Maegan Kelly led the team offensively with 40 points, including 14 goals, in 2011 and was named to the All-BIG EAST First Team. The forward/midfielder was picked for the All-BIG EAST Preseason Team to begin 2012 and is the league's top returning scorer.

Louisville junior Christine Exeter, the league's Preseason Offensive Player of the Year, will look to lead the Cardinals (14-7-3, 8-1-2 BIG EAST) who were picked second in the National Division. Louisville, coming off its first National Division title, tallied 98 points, including two first-place votes. Conference accolades are nothing new for Exeter, who was the 2011 BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year. The forward totaled 31 points, including 14 goals, leading Louisville to the title game of the BIG EAST Championship.

Connecticut was picked second in the American Division with 84 points, including two first-place votes. The Huskies (7-8-2, 4-5-2 BIG EAST) return 15 letterwinners and eight starters in 2012, including a pair of All-BIG EAST Preseason Team selections. Sophomore Riley Houle started 16 games last season and totaled seven points, including

three goals. Senior Danielle Schulmann started 15 games and had a team-leading 15 points, including seven goals. Both were All-BIG EAST Preseason Team picks.

USF was picked third in the American Division with 57 points and will be led by All-BIG EAST Preseason Team member Demi Stokes. A junior forward, Stokes led the Bulls with 12 points, including four goals, last season. Providence was picked fourth with 52 points, tied with Syracuse. The Orange will be led by Preseason Goalkeeper of the Year Brittany Anghel. The junior played every minute of the season last year, making 65 saves with seven shutouts while holding a 1.31 goals-against average.

Georgetown was tabbed third in the National Division totaling 83 points and will be led by sophomore Daphne Corboz. The midfielder had 10 goals and 21 points in 21 games last season. She is an All-BIG EAST Preseason Team member. The Hoyas (15-6, 8-3 BIG EAST) are coming off their best regular season in school history having totaled 15 wins for the second straight year. Georgetown is one of three current BIG EAST teams to amass at least 30 wins over the past two seasons along with Notre Dame (31) and Marquette (33).

Rutgers (8-8-3, 3-5-3 BIG EAST) was picked fourth in the National Division with 78 points and one first-place vote. Rutgers returns All-BIG EAST Preseason selection Jonelle Filigno. A redshirt junior, Filingo started seven games last year and led the team with 13 points before an injury ended her season. The forward was a member of the 2012 Canadian Olympic Team and saw action in London. In 21 career collegiate games, she has 25 points, including 10 goals.

Villanova junior Jami Kranich also was named the league's Preseason Goalkeeper of the Year. She played every minute of the team's 19 games last year, holding a 1.78 goals-against average along with 75 saves. Recently she was named to the United States Under-20 National Team and will head to Japan to compete in the U-20 World Cup. The Wildcats were picked fifth in the National Division with 52 points.

Eight of the league's 12 All-BIG EAST Preseason Team members are juniors, including returning Offensive Player of the Year Christine Exeter.

2012 CHAMPIONSHIP



The BIG EAST's 15 members compete within two divisions, with the top four teams from each division advancing to the 2012 BIG EAST Women's Soccer Championship. The next two teams, regardless of division, will be at-large selections to the 10-team conference championship. With some league teams playing 11 conference games, and some playing 10 conference games, each division will be ordered based on a points per game average.

The top three teams in each division earn first-round byes to the quarterfinals. The first-round and quarterfinal games are conducted on the campuses of the higher-seeded teams.

First-round games will be held on Oct. 25, with the quarterfinals following on Oct. 28. UConn's Joseph J. Morrone Stadium in Storrs, Conn., will serve as host for the semifinals (Nov. 2) as well as the championship game (Nov. 4). It will be the seventh time the championship has been held there and the first time since 2009. The tournament champion receives the league's automatic berth into the 64-team NCAA Division I Women's Soccer Championship.

2012 NCAA DIVISION I WOMEN'S'S SOCCER CHAMPIONSHIP

The winner of the BIG EAST Championship receives the league's automatic bid to the 31th annual, 64-team, NCAA Division I Women's Soccer Championship. First- second- and third-round games, as well as the quarterfinals, are held on the campuses of participating institutions in a single-elimination format. The 2012 College Cup national semifinals and championship games, will be hosted by the University of San Diego in San Diego, Calif., on Dec. 3 and 5. The BIG EAST Conference totaled a league-record 12 wins during the 2010 NCAA Championship, including a national title by Notre Dame. The 2013 NCAA Championship will be held in Cary, N.C., on Dec. 6 and 8.

The 2012-13 academic year is the 34th in the history of The BIG EAST Conference as the unique consortium marches on competing at the highest level with integrity and sportsmanship.

The BIG EAST has gone through membership changes since its birth and continues to make strides in improving the quality and depth of the storied league.

The BIG EAST Conference has been always been driven by lofty goals. The outstanding performances of the student-athletes at BIG EAST schools are evidence of the league's proud tradition of success. The league has always been able to boast that many of its best students are also its best athletes. The 2011-12 year was no different.

In the athletic arena, BIG EAST student-athletes again enjoyed success on the national stage. The Georgetown women's cross country team captured its first NCAA Championship. The win by the Hoyas marked the third-straight year a BIG EAST team has won the women's cross country championship, with Villanova winning the past two. The Louisville men's basketball team advanced to the Final Four in New Orleans. Connecticut field hockey reached the NCAA semifinals, as did the Notre Dame men's lacrosse team. The Irish women's basketball team and Syracuse women's lacrosse team each reached the NCAA finals. USF softball reached the Women's College World Series in

Oklahoma City, Okla., for the first time in program history.

The BIG EAST placed two teams in the NCAA Women's Final Four for the third time in the last four years as Connecticut joined Notre Dame in Denver, with the Fighting Irish advancing to the national title game for the second-straight year.

BIG EAST student-athletes won five NCAA championships. Sheila Reid won her second-straight NCAA Women's Cross Country title. Syracuse hurdler Jarret Eaton won the 60-meter hurdle championship in the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championship. Notre Dame won the distance medley relay at the same championship. Georgetown's Emily Infeld won the 3,000-meter run. Carlos Almeida of Louisville won the 200-yard breaststroke at the NCAA Swimming & Diving Championships. Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 32 national championships in six different sports and 137 student-athletes have won individual national titles through 2011-12.

BIG EAST basketball squads have captured 11 titles in the last 13 years. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA basketball titles in the same season. In '02-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women captured their respective national championships. The BIG EAST placed three men's basketball teams in the Final Four in 1985, the only time this has occurred in NCAA history.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger. The conference currently crowns champions in 24 sports.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the

focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization has had the good fortune to have outstanding leadership. The BIG EAST primarily was the brainchild of Dave Gavitt, who was the conference's first Commissioner. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Gavitt, became Commissioner in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football

BIG EAST football maintained its national profile as a competitively balanced group. Three BIG EAST teams won bowl games, while the BIG EAST representative in the Bowl Championship Series won its bowl game for the fourth time in the last seven years- a streak that includes wins against the ACC, Big 12 and SEC champions.

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A conference in 2005-06 when five new members began competing – the University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, the University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in 18 of the nation's top 50 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Cincinnati and Milwaukee. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets contain more than one-fourth of all television households in the U.S. The BIG EAST will welcome UCF, Houston, Memphis, SMU and Temple in all sports in 2013-14. Temple football will join the league in 2012, with Boise State and San Diego State joining the following year and Navy in 2015. Conference. John Marinatto was the third commissioner of the BIG EAST, serving from 2009-2012, after seven years as the conference's senior associate commissioner. Most recently, Mike Aresco was named commissioner on August 14, 2012.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student athletes. The conference has enjoyed longstanding relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

BIG EAST men's basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden. The women's basketball championship has led all conferences in attendance for the past nine years. Attendance figures also are significant in soccer and baseball.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 student-athletes.

N O T E B O O K

WOMEN'S SOCCER SUCCESS – In the past three seasons, eight different BIG EAST programs have advanced to the NCAAs, including first-time entrants St. John's and USF. The Bulls earned their first NCAA berth in 2010, while St. John's made its inaugural appearance in 2009.

BIG EAST teams totaled a league-record 12 wins during the 2010 NCAA Championship, capped by Notre Dame's national title.

BIG EAST DOTS LONDON OLYMPICS – Seven players with BIG EAST ties were involved with the London Olympics, including gold-medal winners **Carli Lloyd** (Rutgers '04) and **Shannon Boxx** (Notre Dame '98).

Lloyd powered the United States in a 2-1 victory over Japan in the gold medal contest. The 2004 BIG EAST Midfielder of the Year, Lloyd scored in the eighth and 54th minutes.

Lloyd remains RU's all-time points (117) and goals (50) leader and was the 2008 U.S. Soccer Female Athlete of the Year. She also scored a gamewinner in the 2008 Olympics to give the U.S. a 1-0 win over Brazil.

ND alum Shannon Boxx also was a member of the team and earned her third consecutive gold medal to become the first Irish alum with three golds.

In the gold medal finale, a crowd of 80,203 - a record for Olympic soccer – packed into Wembley, one of the sport's most iconic venues.

In addition, a quartet of league players with league ties also earned bronze medals. Preseason All-BIG EAST member and current Rutgers redshirt-junior **Jonelle Filigno**, along with **Melissa Tancredi** (Notre Dame '04), **Candace Chapman** (Notre Dame '05) and former RU assistant coach **Karina LeBanc** helped lead Canada in a 1-0 victory over France. It was the first medal for the Canadian Women's National Team in soccer.

Seton Hall alum **Kelly Smith** '99 played for Great Britain. In three years at Seton Hall, Smith tallied a school-record 76 goals and 174 points in just 51 matches. The only player in the program's history to receive All-America honors, she was named the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year three times.

Two BIG EAST teams will have a pair of players as Notre Dame stars Mandy Laddish and Cari Roccaro will suit up for the United States, while Louisville stars Christine Exeter and Rachel Melhado will play for Canada. Villanova goalkeeper Jami Kranich also will play for the United States, while Marquette's Vanessa Legault-Cordisco will represent Canada.

COMING IN 2013 – The BIG EAST welcomes five teams next season: Houston, Memphis, SMU, UCF and Temple. The quintet combined for 57 wins during the 2011 season will each make immediate contributions to the strength of the league.

Central Florida and **Memphis** were selected for the 2011 NCAA Championship. The Tigers advanced to the Second Round before losing to Louisville (The Tigers' first loss of the year), while the Knights advanced to the quarterfinals before bowing out. Head coach Amanda Cromwell is in her 14th season at UCF, while Memphis is under the directon of 13th-year head coach Brooks Monaghan.

On May 31, 2011, **SMU** hired two-time national Coach of the Year Chris Petrucelli. A familiar name to long-time BIG EAST fans, Petrucelli guided the Notre Dame women's soccer program for nine years (1990-98). During his tenure with Notre Dame, he led the Irish to the 1995 NCAA National Championship, three National Championship title matches (1994-96) and six NCAA Tournament appearances. He also was honored as the 1996 BIG EAST Coach of the Year and led the Irish to BIG EAST crowns during each of his four seasons in the conference.

In June of 2012, **Houston** hired Chris Pfau who came to the Mustangs from Akron. He helped lead the Zips to the 2009 MAC East Division championship and three straight Mid-American Conference Tournaments (2009-11).

Temple is under the direction of second-year head coach Matt Gwilliam. Previously he helped lead Virginia Tech to three-straight NCAA Championship berths during his tenure, guiding the Hokies to the Sweet 16 in 2009.







• Syracuse is coming off one of its most successful seasons in school history. The Orange posted seven wins in 2011, their highest total since head coach Phil Wheddon took over the helm of the program in 2008. Syracuse also registered six BIG EAST victories, the most since 1998 and the second-highest total in school history. SU finished third in the American Division and appeared in the BIG EAST Championship for the first time since 2005.

• Goalkeeper Brittany Anghel enters her junior season ranked third on Syracuse's career shutouts leader list with 13. Anghel recorded seven shutouts last season and posted a 1.31 goals-against average and a .722 save percentage. She competed on the U.S. national U-23 squad this summer in the Three Nations Tournament in Norway.

• Four of Syracuse's top six scorers return from last year's balanced scoring attack. Junior Cecilia Borgstrom finished second on the squad in goals (three) and points (seven) in 2011, while seniors Rosina Callisto and Jenna Rickan and freshman Megan Hunsberger tallied five points apiece. Overall, 11 different players scored goals for the Orange last season.

Two-time BIG EAST Midfielder of the Year Ingrid Wells earned her honor after accumulating 17 points, including a league-best nine assists, during conference play. The only unanimous All-BIG EAST selection, Wells was named to the M.A.C. Hermann Trophy Watch List as one of the top players in the nation. She helped boost the Hoyas' offense, which ranked among the league leaders at 2.60 goals per game. In all games, the redshirt senior leads the team with 30 points, including 12 assists. Wells scored a pair of game-winning goals this season and is arguably one of the most dynamic players in the league. She is the first player to win back-toback Midfielder of the Year honors since UConn's Meghan Schnur in 2006-07.



Coach of the Year Karen Ferguson-Dayes, Louisville

Head coach Karen Ferguson-Dayes has led the Cardinals (8-1-2 BIG EAST) to a No. 1 seed in the BIG EAST Championship, their first, and earned BIG EAST Coach of the Year honors. The Cardinals also are unbeaten in 12 of their last 13 games, and won a school-record eight conference games. Picked to finish fourth in the league's preseason poll, Louisville won its first BIG EAST National Division crown. Ferguson-Dayes is in her 11th season with Louisville.

Offensive Player of the Year

Exeter earned BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year honors after totaling 24 points and scoring a league-

leading 11 goals in conference action. The sophomore recorded at least one point in 11 of 12 league games, and tallied 29 points overall. Exeter also helped lead the Cardinals to their first BIG EAST regular-season crown as the National Division champions. Last year, Exeter was the first Louisville player to earn one of the league's major awards after being tabbed BIG EAST Rookie of the Year. Exeter also is the first sophomore to earn Offensive Player of the Year honors since Notre Dame's Kerri Hanks in 2006.



Defensive Player of the Year Kerry McBride, Marquette, Sr., D

McBride was named BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year for the second straight season. The senior helped

lead one of the league's top defenses, allowing just seven goals in 11 conference games and posting a 0.63 goals-against average. Outside of conference action, Marquette ranked first in the BIG EAST with a 0.64 goals-against average and 12 shutouts. McBride also helped limit Marquette opponents to just 2.5 shots on goal per game. Earlier in the season, McBride was named to the M.A.C. Hermann Trophy Watch List as one of the top players in the nation. She is the first player to win back-to-back Defensive Player of the Year honors since Notre Dame's Jen Grubb in 1998-99.



Goalkeeper of the Year Natalie Kulla, Marquette, Sr., GK

For the second straight year, Kulla followed her Preseason Goalkeeper of the Year selection with the BIG EAST Goalkeeper of the Year honor. Holding a league-leading 0.66 goals-against average, Kulla helped lead Marquette to its third consecutive American Division title. The senior totaled seven shutouts in conference action and anchored a team that ranked first in the league in goalsagainst average at 0.64. In all games, Kulla totaled 10 shutouts and held a 0.67 goals-against average. She is the first person to win backto-back Goalkeeper of the Year honors since Villanova's Jillian Loyden (2005-2007).



Rookie of the Year Kate Schwindel, West Virginia, Fr., F

Schwindel was tabbed the BIG EAST Rookie of the Year after totaling 16 points, including five goals this year. In league play she had 15 points, including five goals, to

rank among the BIG EAST leaders. She also earned BIG EAST Rookie of the Week honors on Oct. 10. Schwindel is the first West Virginia player to be named BIG EAST Rookie of the Year since Ashley Banks shared the honor with Kia McNeill (Boston College) in 2004.



Team Fair Play Award Notre Dame

Notre Dame, under the direction of 13th-year head coach Randy Waldrum, earns the third annual team

Fair Play Award after totaling just 77 points (67 fouls, two yellow cards and zero red cards) during conference play. The Fair Play Award is given to the team that accumulates the fewest points using the following scoring system: foul (one point), yellow card (five points) and red card (10 points).







2011-12 Highlights

• NCAA championship in women's cross country (Georgetown). The win by the Hoyas marked the thirdstraight year a BIG EAST team has won the women's cross country championship, with Villanova winning the past two.

• NCAA runner-up finishes in women's basketball (Notre Dame) and women's lacrosse (Syracuse).

• NCAA semifinal appearances by Connecticut field hockey and Notre Dame men's lacrosse.

• For the first time in program history, USF reached the Women's College World Series.

• The BIG EAST had two women's basketball teams in the Final Four for the third time in the last four years.

• Villanova's Sheila Reid won the NCAA women's cross country title for the second-straight year, giving her five career NCAA individual titles in cross country and track & field.

• BIG EAST football teams won three bowl games, winning against opponents from the ACC, Big 12 and SEC.

• At the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships, Syracuse's Jarret Eaton won the 60-meter hurdle, Georgetown's Emily Infield won the 3,000-meter run and the Notre Dame men's distance medley relay won the national title.

• Louisville's Carlos Almeida won the national title in the 200-yard breaststroke at the NCAA Swimming & Diving Championships. Almeida also finished as the national runner-up in the 100 breaststroke.

• Villanova's Sheila Reid (cross country) won Honda Sports Awards as the top performer in cross country.

• The BIG EAST had 19 Capital One Academic All-America selections. Eric Finan (Cincinnati track & field), Peter Bolgert (Marquette track & field), Kevyn Smith (Syracuse football), Sheila Reid (Villanova track & field), Kaitlyn Gillespie (West Virginia track & field) and Kate Harrison (West Virginia track & field) were all first team selections.






