OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Gary Nova • So. • QB • Rutgers • Elmwood Park, N.J.

Nova led Rutgers to its eighth consecutive win and helped the Scarlet Knights improve to 4-0 in BIG EAST play with four second-half touchdown passes in a 35-10 win at Temple. Trailing 10-0 at halftime, Nova led a Scarlet Knight offense that scored 35 unanswered points to close the game. He completed 17 of 27 passes for 232 yards, helping Rutgers to just its third 7-0 start in program history and its second 4-0 start in BIG EAST play.



DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Lorenzo Mauldin • So. • DE • Louisville • Atlanta, Ga.

Mauldin helped Louisville remain unbeaten at 7-0 as the Cardinals scored a 27-25 win against USF to improve to 2-0 in BIG EAST play for just the second time. Mauldin had six tackles, including two sacks and three tackles for loss, to go with a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and a quarterback hurry. His strip sack and fumble recovery came late in the first half and allowed Louisville to take a 14-3 lead into halftime.



SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Ross Krautman • Jr. • K • Syracuse • Franklin Lakes, N.J.

Krautman scored 16 points — the most by a BIG EAST kicker in a game this season — to help Syracuse to a 40-10 win against Connecticut, improving the Orange to 2-1 in BIG EAST play. Krautman hit field goals of 22, 33, 42 and 47 yards and was 4-for-4 on PATs. He finished the game with 203 career points, tying Don McAulay for eighth on Syracuse's career chart.

Every BIG EAST team finished with at least five wins in 2011. The only other time that an existing Bowl Subdivision conference had each member finish with at least five wins was in 1904 and 1905, when the Big Nine (now the Big Ten) had all of its members with at least five victories.

No Layups Here

The BIG EAST is the only Bowl Subdivision conference in which each member won at least four games in 2011. In fact, the BIG EAST is the only FBS conference that did not have a team with three wins or fewer.

We're All In

The BIG EAST is the only Division I conference that has seen each of its current members play in at least one bowl game in the past two seasons. The BIG EAST is also the only league in which each team has at least one bowl win in the last four years.

Perfection

Two BIG EAST teams are among the 11 Bowl Subdivision squads that are unbeaten through Week 8 of the season. Rutgers and Louisville are both 7-0, along with Notre Dame, Kansas State, Ohio, Alabama, Oregon, Mississippi State and Florida. Ohio State is 8-0, while Oregon State is 6-0.

Totally Offensive

USF QB B.J. Daniels ranks third on the BIG EAST's career total offense chart. Daniels has 9,962 yards of total offense, leaving him 913 yards behind former USF QB Matt Grothe, who holds the record with 10,875 yards. Former West Virginia quarterback Pat White is second on the list with 10,529 career yards.

NOTES

Temple is 2-1 in BIG EAST play following a 35-10 setback to Rutgers last Saturday at Lincoln Financial Field ... The Owls took a 10-0 halftime lead against the 15th-ranked Scarlet Knights, but saw Rutgers score 35 unanswered points to close the game ... A Temple win would give the Owls three BIG EAST victories for just the second time in league history (1997) ... Temple, which defeated Connecticut 17-14 in overtime two weeks ago, is looking for its first back-to-back BIG EAST road wins since 1998 ... RB Montel Harris ranks fourth in the BIG EAST in rushing (78.2 yards per game) ... Harris has rushed for 391 yards and three touchdowns and has started each of the last three games ... QB Chris Coyer is 10th in the BIG EAST in rushing (55.3 ypg) and first among quarterbacks ... Coyer has thrown seven touchdown passes against three interceptions ... RB Matt Brown is third in the BIG EAST in all-purpose yardage (133.8 ypg) ... LB Tyler Matekevich, a true freshman, has started each of the last three games and has had double-digit tackles each time ... LB Nate D. Smith leads the team with 48 tackles, while Matekevich is second with 46 ... K/P Brandon McManus leads the BIG EAST in punting with an average of 45.3 yards per punt.

POLL EXPLANATION & ABOUT THE BCS:

To derive a team's poll percentages in the Harris Interactive and *USA Today* polls, each team's point total is divided by a maximum 2875 possible points in the Harris Interactive Poll and 1475 possible points in the *USA Today* Poll. Teams are assigned a point total for each of their respective computer poll rankings to determine the overall computer component. The highest and lowest ranking for each team is dropped, and the sum total of the remaining four rankings is divided by 100 (the maximum possible points). This figure produces a Computer Rankings Percentage. The six computer ranking providers are Anderson & Hester (A&H), Richard Billingsley (B), Colley Matrix (CM), Kenneth Massey (M), Jeff Sagarin (S) and Peter Wolfe (W). Each computer ranking accounts for schedule strength within its formula. The BCS Average is calculated by averaging the percent totals of the Harris Interactive and USA Today Polls, and Computer rankings. The highest BCS Average receives the No. 1 ranking, the second highest receives No. 2, and so forth.

The BCS is a five-game arrangement for post-season college football that is managed by the 11 Bowl Subdivision conferences and Notre Dame. Its purpose is to match the two top-ranked teams in the final BCS standings in a national championship game and to create competitive matchups in the four other BCS bowl games. A LOOK AHEAD

The BIG EAST is Doing Big Things

The BIG EAST has been a leader in major college football since the formation of the football conference in 1991. The league has produced two national championship teams and three national runners-up.

BIG EAST teams have gone 7-7 all-time in Bowl Championship Series games since the formation of the BCS in 1999. The BIG EAST is one of just five conferences (along with the Mountain West, SEC, WAC and Pac-12) with at least a .500 record in BCS games.

A BIG EAST team has finished among the top eight in the final Associated Press poll four times in the past seven years.

Since 2006, the BIG EAST has had two teams (Louisville, Cincinnati) finish the season with at least 12 wins. In the 2013 season, the BIG EAST will include teams that have produced eight 12-win seasons since 2006 (five by Boise State, one each by Cincinnati, Louisville and Houston).

When the BIG EAST last reconfigured, for the 2005 season, the three incoming members were able to reach unprecedented heights. Cincinnati, Louisville and USF have all achieved rankings in the top three of the BCS standings since joining the BIG EAST.

The BIG EAST's incoming members bring a combination of proven achievement and unlimited potential.

Boise State has won two BCS bowl games since 2007 and has finished in the top 12 in the final BCS standings six times since 2004.

UCF finished No. 25 in the final 2010 BCS standings, has the second-largest undergraduate enrollment in the country and is located in the nation's No. 19 media market.

Houston won 13 games last season, was ranked No. 19 in the final BCS standings and is situated in the nation's 10th-largest media market.

Memphis played in five bowl games in six years between 2003 and 2008 and is located in a top-50 media market.

Navy, which will join the BIG EAST in 2015, played in a bowl game in eight consecutive years from 2003-10.

San Diego State has played in back-to-back bowl games, is located in a rich recruiting area, plays in an NFL stadium and is part of the 28th-ranked media market.

SMU has played in a bowl game in each of the past three seasons, is located in the nation's No. 5 media market and is enjoying a football resurgence.

Temple has averaged nearly nine wins in the past three years, is in a top-five media market, plays in an NFL stadium and has reached the postseason in two of the last three years.

Changes Are Coming

The BIG EAST membership will undergo significant changes in the coming years, a process that began with the 2012 season as Temple returns to the league as a football-playing member. Here is the breakdown of the coming membership changes:

- 2012 Temple joins as a football-only member, replacing West Virginia.
- 2013 UCF, Houston, Memphis and SMU join the conference as all-sports members. Temple becomes a member in all sports. Boise State and San Diego State join as football-only members. Syracuse and Pittsburgh depart.
- 2015 Navy joins as a football-playing member.

In addition to the quality on the playing field, the expanded BIG EAST will have a national reach that spans four time zones and has a direct presence in 13 of the nation's top 50 media markets, covering nearly 28 percent of the nation's households — by far the most of any intercollegiate conference.

BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The 2012-13 season will be the 15th year for the BCS, which is a five-game arrangement that is designed to match the two top-rated teams in a national championship game and to create exciting and competitive match-ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other bowl games.



The BCS enhances the importance of the regular season and maintains the bowl system for the benefit of the game. It has been undeniably successful in achieving those goals; college football has never been more popular, and the BCS is a significant reason for that. Additionally, it has provided more access to the major bowls, more television exposure, and more post-season revenue than ever before.

The five bowl games are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the Discover Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game Presented by VIZIO, the Allstate Sugar Bowl, and the BCS National Championship Game that is played at one of the bowl sites. The 2013 Discover BCS National Championship Game will be played at the Sun Life Stadium in Miami.

The BCS is not an entity. Instead, it is an event managed by the 11 NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision conferences, all of them "BCS Conferences," and the independent institutions through a series of contracts among bowls and television networks. The conferences are the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Conference USA, Mid-American, Mountain West, Sun Belt, Pacific-12, Southeastern, and Western Athletic.

ESPN will televise all five BCS bowl games.

Playoff Coming In 2014-15

On June 26, 2012, the BCS Presidential Oversight Committee agreed to launch a four-team playoff beginning with the 2014-15 season. The new format will continue for at least 12 years, though the 2025-26 season.

The semifinals will be rotated among six bowl games and will be played either New Year's Eve or New Year's Day. The championship game, to be rotated among neutral sites every year, will be played on a Monday at least six days after the last semifinal game.

BCS Automatic Qualifications

1. The top two teams in the final BCS standings will play in the National Championship Game.
2. The champions of the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-12, and Southeastern conferences will have automatic berths in one of the participating bowls each year through the 2013 regular season.
3. The champion of Conference USA, the Mid-American Conference, the Mountain West Conference, the Sun Belt Conference, or the Western Athletic Conference will earn an automatic berth in a BCS game if either: A. Such team is ranked in the top 12 of the final BCS Standings, or, B. Such team is ranked in the top 16 of the final BCS Standings and its ranking in the final BCS Standings is higher than that of a champion of a conference that has an annual automatic berth in one of the BCS bowls.
4. Notre Dame will automatically qualify for a BCS bowl if it is in the top eight of the final BCS Standings.
5. If any of the 10 slots remain open after application of provisions 1 through 4, and an at-large team from a conference with an annual automatic berth for its champion is ranked No. 3 in the final BCS Standings, that team shall become an automatic qualifier.
6. If any of the 10 slots remain open after application of provisions 1 through 5, and if Step No. 5 has not been applied and an at-large team from a conference with an annual automatic berth for its champion is ranked No. 4 in the final BCS Standings, that team shall become an automatic qualifier, provided that no at-large team from the same conference qualifies for the National Championship Game.
7. If any slots remain unfilled after the placement of all teams qualifying for an automatic berth, then the bowls shall choose their participants from the "pool of eligible teams" (see below.)

Pool of Eligible Teams

If berths are available after the automatic qualifiers have been identified, then the bowls shall select at-large participants from the "pool of eligible teams," which shall include any Bowl Subdivision team that is bowl-eligible and meets the following requirements:

- A. Has won at least nine regular-season games, and
- B. Is among the top 14 teams in the final BCS Standings

BIG EAST 2012 BOWL LINEUP

The Lineup

In addition to the Bowl Championship Series, the BIG EAST Conference also has agreements with a number of other postseason bowl games. The conference's current lineup, which began in the 2010 season, has the BIG EAST paired against three of the other five automatic-qualifying Bowl Championship Series conferences in the postseason, giving the BIG EAST its strongest bowl partnerships in its history.

The BIG EAST announced a four-year agreement with Florida Citrus Sports and the Russell Athletic Bowl to send a team to the Orlando, Fla., game beginning in the 2010 season.

The Russell Athletic Bowl will have the first selection from the BIG EAST after the league's BCS representative has been determined. The BIG EAST's opponent in the Russell Athletic Bowl will be from the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The Russell Athletic Bowl had the opportunity to select Notre Dame, in place of a BIG EAST team, once during the four-year agreement and exercised that option in 2011.

The BIG EAST has extended its agreement with the Belk Bowl in Charlotte, N.C., through the 2013 season as well. The Belk Bowl will have the BIG EAST's third selection, after the BCS and Russell Athletic Bowl.

The BIG EAST has been aligned with the Belk Bowl since the inception of the game in 2002. The game has averaged more than 62,000 fans and was named one of the five best startups in sports in the previous five years by Sports Business Journal.

The 2010 season featured the introduction of a new bowl game in New York City when the BIG EAST participated in the first New Era Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium. The New Era Pinstripe Bowl pits the fourth overall selection from the BIG EAST against a team from the Big 12 Conference. In the event that the Big 12 is unable to supply a team for the game, Notre Dame could step in as the opponent of the BIG EAST's representative.

The BIG EAST completed its bowl lineup by renewing deals with the BBVA Compass Bowl in Birmingham, Ala., and the Beef 'O' Brady's Bowl in St. Petersburg, Fla. The conference also announced a new agreement with the AutoZone Liberty Bowl in Memphis, Tenn. The BIG EAST will send teams to two of those three games in each of the 2010-13 seasons.

The BBVA Compass Bowl pairs a BIG EAST team against an opponent from the Southeastern Conference at Legion Field in Birmingham.

If a BIG EAST team is chosen for the AutoZone Liberty Bowl, the conference's representative would face either the Conference USA champion or an opponent from the Southeastern Conference.

The Beef 'O' Brady's Bowl will be played for the fifth time in 2012. The BIG EAST representative will face a Conference USA opponent at Tropicana Field in St. Petersburg.
