

Park Farm Pippin^{EM}

(Falstaff x A409-21)

A new attractive early variety with very low susceptibility to disease. The bright red fruits have excellent skin finish and are crisp and juicy with a good balance of sweetness and acidity. Forms a vigorous tree with spreading habit, heavy cropping. Harvested:

Late August/early September Pollinators:

Kent, Jupiter.

GreensleevesEM

(James Grieve x Golden Delicious)

RHS Award of Garden Merit

A green/yellow early apple with a good flavour. Crisp, juicy and slightly sharp. Crops freely, very precocious, an ideal garden apple.

Early September, will store until November.

Pollinators:

Fiesta (Red Pippin), Cox.

BountifuleM

(Cox open-pollinated)

A predominantly green culinary apple. Acidity less than Bramley but cooks to give a delicious flavour needing only a little sugar. The first new cooking apple for more than 50 years. Forms a compact tree, half the size of Bramley, comes into heavy cropping, quickly making it an attractive proposition for small gardens.

Egremont Russet

PRHS Award of Garden Merit

The most popular russet variety. The skin colour is green/yellow becoming golden as it ripens. Usually, approximately half the skin develops its characteristic russeting. The fruit flesh is firm, a little dry but with a rich, nutty flavour.

PRHS Award of Garden Merit

An attractive apple with bright red blush and stripes on a yellow/green background. Excellent skin finish, crisp and juicy with a pleasant aromatic flavour. The most outstanding new commercial apple variety. Forms a moderately vigorous tree with wide branch angles and a drooping habit. Crops heavily. Harvested:

Late September, will store to March.

JupiterEM

(Cox x Starking Delicious)

♥RHS Award of Garden Merit

An ideal choice for gardeners who want a Cox-type apple.
Easy to grow, crops heavily and regularly, giving very good size and flavour. Triploid.

Greensleeves, Falstaff.

SaturnEM

(PRI 1235 x Starkspur Golden Delicious)

An ideal choice for gardeners who want to grow an apple with low susceptibility to disease. Fruits are slightly conical, blushed red with excellent skin finish and a pleasant sweet flavour. Forms a medium sized tree with good spreading habit, precocious and heavy cropping. Chosen in 2004 by the British Library to be their 'Tree of Knowledge'.



**PRHS Award of Garden Merit*

An early maturing pear with outstanding qualities. Fruit is small but of very good quality with a white juicy flesh, free from stone cells and an excellent flavour.

Forms a moderately vigorous tree upright and precocious.

Harvested:

Late August, will store for two weeks.

Conference, Comice.

ConcordeEM

(Conference x Comice)

♥RHS Award of Garden Merit

An excellent main crop variety. The fruit has a very regular shape and a good skin finish. The ripe fruit is buttery, juicy and free from stone cells with a pleasant sweet flavour. Tree flowers prolifically and sets good crops early in its life. Crops heavily and regularly.

Williams Bon Chrétien

♥RHS Award of Garden Merit

Medium to large-sized pale green fruit which turns yellow as it ripens and has faint red stripes and russet spots. Delicious flavour.

RHS Award of Garden Merit

Medium to large sized longnecked fruit, deep green in colour, sometimes russeted, reddish-brown. Regular cropper. Self-fertile which results in poorly-shaped parthenocarpic fruit. Fruit appearance better if pollinated.

Medium-sized oval to pearshaped fruit of the very best flavour. Unfortunately, can be rather shy to crop and often grows very vigorously.

If trees of medium size are desired the rootstock Quince A should be chosen. Dwarfer trees are produced on Quince C and EMH.

Sweet Cherries

Sunburst

Bears very large black fruits which ripen mid-season. Some susceptibility to canker. Self-fertile, so does not need a pollinator. If there is room for only one cherry tree, then Sunburst is the variety to try.

(Colney x Inge)

A large, dark red, late ripening cherry which crops reliably and appears to be resistant to bacterial canker.

Sour Cherries

Morello

PRHS Award of Garden Merit

Acid, dark red fruit, ripening late, smaller than most sweet cherries - culinary. Resistant to bacterial canker. Makes a small tree which can be netted against birds and is suitable for growing against a wall, even a north wall. Self-fertile.

Cherry Rootstocks

Sweet cherries can grow into enormous trees. Except for large gardens, where Colt rootstock should be satisfactory, try one of the new dwarfing rootstocks such as Gisela or Edabriz. Colt is suitable for Morello.

Early Season Sanctus Hubertus

PRHS Award of Garden Merit

A continental variety which ripens in early August. The fruit is medium-large, oval with a purple skin colour. It is part clingstone and has a pleasant flavour. The tree is of medium vigour. The flowers are selfsterile.

PRHS Award of Garden Merit

An English variety ripening in mid-late August. It is very similar to greengage but is better cropping. The fruit is of medium size, round with a green skin. It is part clingstone and has a typical sweet, scented gage flavour. The tree is medium to vigorous. Flowers are partly self-fertile.

Opal

PRHS Award of Garden Merit

A Swedish variety which ripens in early August. The fruit is of medium size, oval with a purply/pink skin. It is freestone and has a good flavour. The tree is of medium vigour with a spreading habit. The flowers are partly self-sterile but cropping will be improved with a pollinator.

(Seedling of Count Althan's Gage)

The classic English variety ripening at the beginning of September. The fruit is medium large oval with a red skin. It is freestone and is good for eating fresh or for cooking. The tree is of medium vigour with a semi-drooping habit. The flowers are self-fertile and require no pollinator. It is a good pollinator for many other varieties.

PRHS Award of Garden Merit

An English variety ripening at the end of September. The fruit is large and oval with a purple skin. It is clingstone with a bland flavour but cooks quite well. The tree is vigorous with an upright habit. The flowers are partly self-fertile so cropping will be improved with a pollinator.

Merryweather Damson

An English variety ripening midlate September. The fruit is small, oval with a blue/black skin. It is clingstone and is too astringent to eat fresh but is very good for cooking and makes superb jam. The tree is of medium vigour with a dense spreading habit. Partly self-fertile.

Plum Rootstocks

Most plums are grown on St. Julien A, which produces trees of medium size. Newer rootstocks, such as Pixy and Ferlenain can be used where small trees are required.



liscellaneous

Medlar

Forms a small tree with relatively large, late, cream coloured flowers. Fruits are interesting rather than appetising and not considered edible until overripe.

Wulberry

A picturesque spreading tree, too large for small gardens. It is Morus nigra rather than Morus alba which has the richly flavoured purple fruit resembling raspberries. Widely available

A small tree with relatively large flowers in late spring. The golden fruit, rather like large oblong apples, cannot be eaten fresh.

Caspberries

Summer Fruiting Raspberries

Glen Ample

PRHS Award of Garden Merit

Very heavy cropping variety with large, blunt conical to round fruit. The fruit is firm, medium red, has fairly large drupelets and a good flavour.

Recommended for fresh, freezing and jam. It has a long ripening season and crops from late June until the beginning of August. The canes are tall, vigorous and spine-free but susceptible to cane diseases. Tie in approximately six canes per metre of row, pruning out the weakest and any very stout canes. This will reduce foliage and cane diseases and make the fruit easier to pick. Widely available

Tulameen

Heavy cropping Canadian variety which has excellent quality fruit and very good flavour. Not widely available yet, but worth ordering from a specialist supplier. The fruit is large, conical, medium red, glossy and moderately firm and is recommended for fresh, freezing and jam. Crops from the beginning of July until early August. Canes are very tall and laterals very long but the fruit is

well presented and easy to pick. Canes are susceptible to cane diseases so limit the number per metre of row to encourage good air circulation. Canes can grow up to 3m, so wind them along the top wire in the autumn. Tip them to the final height required in February or March.

OctaviaEM

Heavy cropping, very late ripening variety which ripens from mid July to mid August in South East England and bridges the gap between summer fruiters and autumn fruiters. Fruit is large. firm, blunt conical to round in shape, easily plugged, medium red and good flavour. Recommended for fresh, freezing and jam. Canes are moderately tall and laterals are produced well down the canes. New canes are spiny but the spines are not a problem when picking the fruit. Laterals are fairly upright, moderately leafy and the fruit is mostly close together at the tip of the lateral. Octavia is moderately resistant to cane Botrytis and cane spot but susceptible to spur blight. Resistant to the large raspberry aphid which transmits four virus diseases.

attractive pink flowers in spring, and in warm sheltered gardens these may be followed by fruit. Leaf curl and mildew can devastate the foliage if not controlled, so peaches are not suitable if low maintenance is important.



Malling Admiral^{EM}

♥RHS Award of Garden Merit

Moderately high yielding variety with medium-sized, conical, bright red berries with a good flavour. Recommended for all purposes. Crops for 4-5 weeks from early July. Resistant to spur blight and cane Botrytis but its long laterals are rather weakly attached and a sheltered position is recommended to prevent lateral breakage.

Moderately heavy cropping variety with medium-sized, round, dark

red fruit with an excellent flavour. If flavour is important to you then Leo or Tulameen are the varieties to grow.

Crops from mid July to mid August. Produces a moderate number of very long, spiny canes and long laterals. Some shelter is advisable. Resistant to several cane diseases and to the large raspberry aphid which transmits four virus diseases.

ValentinaEM

Very heavy cropping, apricotcoloured summer fruiting variety released primarily for the amateur gardener. Produces masses of large, apricot-coloured fruit with a delicious flavour. Early ripening and crops from mid June to the end of July. It is only recommended for eating fresh. Canes are very healthy and the foliage is a light, bright green.

Autumn Fruiting or Primocane Raspberries

Malling Autumn BlissEM

♥RHS Award of Garden Merit

Berries are large, dark red and have a good flavour. The crop is produced little and often over a long period and is normally eaten fresh, but it can be frozen and used for jam. The fruit is produced on the current year's canes and Autumn Bliss crops from late July until mid October. Canes which have fruited are cut

down in late winter so no selective pruning or tying-in required. Canes grow to 1.5m so short posts and a single wire is sufficient support. Pull out the later emerging spawn (new cane) so that the bed does not become too crowded. Resistant to the large raspberry aphid, which transmits four viruses. Over-wintering cane diseases are not an

issue as the canes are removed before the new canes emerge.

Blackberries & Hybrid Berries

Ashton Cross

Very heavy cropping blackberry with medium to small sized berries with a good but slightly acid flavour. Crops from mid August to mid September. Very vigorous with trailing, thorny canes.

Heavy cropping, early ripening blackberry with medium-sized, glossy black fruit, sweet but bland flavour. Good for freezing. Crops from late July until late August. Vigorous with trailing thorny canes.

Heavy cropping, thornless, semierect blackberry with large glossy fruits with a pleasant flavour when fully ripe. Fruits tend to turn black before they are fully ripe. Immature fruit can be acid and tends to go red after freezing. Produces only a moderate number of canes, often very stout, which need careful training to a support trellis. Crops over a long season from mid August to late September.

Waldo

Moderately vigorous, thornless blackberry with well exposed fruit on short, sturdy laterals. Fruit is large, firm, glossy and excellent flavour and is recommended for fresh and freezing. Canes are semi-erect and rather brittle so need careful training onto the support wires as they grow. Crops from beginning of August until early October. Good resistance to cane diseases.

High yielding loganberry-type with large, long conical, purple berries with a good flavour if picked fully ripe. Recommended for fresh, freezing and jam. Crops from early July to early August. Vigorous with trailing, very thorny canes.

A naturally occurring thorn-free mutant of Tayberry which was discovered on a Buckinghamshire allotment. In all other respects, similar to Tayberry.

Strawberries

Early Season

EmilyEM

Earliest of all strawberry varieties, cropping 7-14 days ahead of the mid season types. Plants are moderately vigorous and produce a good yield of medium sized berries. Dark colour and quite sharp flavour. Best grown under cloches or fleece to avoid frost damage to the flowers Available from:

♥RHS Award of Garden Merit

Very early bearing with moderate yield. Fruits regularly shaped with strong skin but soft flesh. Flavour is best in cool seasons and the variety is best suited to Northern England and Scotland. Susceptible to Verticillium wilt. Available from:

A high yielding early variety with the same season as Honeoye. Berries are large and sweet with regular shape and deep red colour. Maintains good fruit size on older plants. Susceptible to Verticillium wilt.

Moderately early and one of the most popular strawberries for the amateur market. Large attractive berries with a sweet flavour. High yield and good drought tolerance. Susceptible to Verticillium wilt.

Has a long picking season with a good yield of large berries that are sweet and juicy. Maintains fruit size well over successive seasons. Plants are moderately resistant to wilt and crown rot but susceptible to powdery mildew.

Produces large berries with good flavour. Establishment can be poor in the first year but generally yields are good. Very susceptible to Verticillium wilt, other soil borne diseases and powdery mildew.

A very reliable variety which produces good yields of medium sized berries. Flavour is only moderate and jam made from this variety will tend to turn brown after a few months. Good all round disease resistance.

A very large fruited variety that produces high yields. Berries are juicy and sweet but rather soft. Very susceptible to Verticillium wilt but has good drought tolerance.

Late/mid-season type. High yield of attractive berries with regular, conical shape and glossy skin. A very consistent performer in a variety of growing conditions. Resistant to splitting in wet seasons and moderately resistant to Verticillium wilt.

Vigorous plants that produce a very high yield of large berries with deep red colour and sweet flavour. Good all round disease resistance and easy to grow in a variety of different conditions. Excellent for jam.

The variety of choice for organic growing. Robust, vigorous plants with good all round disease resistance, large berries and a high yield. The berries are dark in colour and have good flavour provided they are harvested when fully ripe.

Produces a light crop from mid August to October. The berries are soft with very good flavour. Very susceptible to powdery mildew.

A very productive everbearing variety that crops from August to October. Medium sized, orange red berries. Plants are vigorous and moderately resistant to Verticillium wilt but susceptible to powdery mildew Available from:

Produces a moderate yield from August to October. Firm fruit with good flavour. Moderately resistant to Verticillium wilt. Leaves susceptible to powdery mildew but fruits rarely affected Available from:

September/October, following a smaller crop in July/August,
Berries are large, sweet and juicy, with a very attractive appearance. Vigorous plants with good resistance to
Verticillium wilt and moderate resistance to powdery mildew.

Heavy crop from medium-sized bush, large fruit borne on medium-length strigs. Crops in mid July but fruit hangs well on the plant after it is ripe. Suitable for all uses. Resistant to mildew, leafspot and blackcurrant leaf curling midge.

High yield from vigorous, upright bush. Produces large, goodflavoured currants suitable for all uses. Avoids early frosts by late flowering and late frosts by frost tolerance. Resistant to mildew and leaf spot but very susceptible to leaf curling midge.

Redcurrants

Jonkheer van Tets

PRHS Award of Garden Merit

Early ripening variety which produces a high yield of attractive currants on long strigs in early/mid-July.

Rovada

High yielding, late ripening redcurrant which crops in late July/ early August. Produces long strigs of large, dark red currants which have a good flavour and hang well on the plant. Vigorous, fairly erect bush. Resistant to mildew and leafspot.

RedpollEM

Very late ripening variety, which crops in early August. Very high yield from vigorous, spreading bush (would benefit from trellising or some support). Immensely long strigs of medium-sized, bright red, attractive currants. Fruits hang well on the plant without deteriorating for several weeks. Moderately resistant to mildew and leafspot.

White Versailles

An old variety but probably the best which is widely available. It produces a high yield of large, whitish/yellow currants with a sweet flavour. Ripens in early July.

Heavy crop of medium-sized, pale green berries produced by a moderate sized, spiny bush. Suitable for all purposes. Resistant to mildew and leafspot and recommended for smaller gardens. Will produce blemishfree fruit without the use of fungicides.

Very heavy crop of medium to large, pale green berries suitable for all purposes. Vigorous, fairly upright habit but spiny. Recommend rubbing off the lowest buds on the young plant and growing on a short stem in sheltered positions. In more exposed situations the plant is better grown as a stooled bush. Resistant to mildew on the foliage and the fruit. Will produce blemish-free fruit without the use of fungicides. Available from:

Generally believed to have the
best flavour of the dessert goose-

Prima Donna^{EM}

A compact, hardy perennial climber that can be grown on a trellis, wall or 'runner bean' wigwam, reaching a height of 6-9 feet. Prima Donna produces lush, green, attractive foliage with dainty flowers appearing in July. Cones suitable for flavouring all types of beer or rustic decoration appear in late summer and autumn, ready for harvest in early September. Cones harvested by gently pulling from the plant, should be dried naturally for several days in the dark or in an airing cupboard. Available from:

Mar. Mui

Golden Tassels has the same dwarf growing habit and excellent brewing characteristics of its parent Prima Donna, but with attractive, dramatic golden foliage. The golden foliage complements plants with dark green or purple foliage and is most striking if planted where it will receive direct spring sunshine. Cones are encouraged if the plant receives slight shade and should be ready for harvest in mid-September. Brews
