About the International Congress for Conservation Biology (ICCB)

The Society for Conservation Biology (SCB) meetings are a forum for addressing conservation challenges. They are the global venue for presenting and discussing new research and developments in conservation sciences and practice. Most importantly, they connect our global community of conservation professionals and serve as the major networking outlet for anyone interested in conservation. Attendance at our international conferences exceeds 1500 delegates from all corners of the world.

The first ICCB was held in 1988 in Bozeman, Montana, USA. Since then, the Congress has been held in Africa, Australia, Asia, Europe, and North and South America. The 2011 meeting will be the first ever held in New Zealand. Plenary sessions are presented by conservation leaders and visionaries. Each meeting features numerous symposia, concurrent sessions, workshops, short courses, and field trips. Past symposia have included such diverse topics as: the population biology of invasive species; global amphibian declines; how to integrate conservation research into policy; indigenous communities and conservation; and real-world social and economic solutions to preserved biodiversity.

ICCB Attendees

ICCB 2011 will bring together conservation professionals and students from every sector of the field, including the biological and social sciences, management, policy, and planning. Attendees work for universities, government agencies, non-governmental organisations, industry, private foundations and organisations, and publications. They are scientists, students, managers, decision-makers, writers, and other conservation professionals from throughout the world.

About the Society for Conservation Biology

Dedicated to advancing the science and practise of conserving the Earth's biological diversity, the Society for Conservation Biology is a global community of conservation professionals with more than 12,000 members from over 140 countries. The Society's membership comprises a wide range of people interested in the conservation and study of biological diversity: resource managers, educators, government and private conservation workers, and students.

Publications and Programmes

The Society provides many benefits to its community, including local, regional, and global networks, free online access to publications for members in developing countries, and a very popular online job board. But it is also a place where primary production and industries dominate the economy, and their interactions with biodiversity continue to threaten conservation success. Engagement with farmers, foresters, fishers and business, as well as with local communities, NGOs and government agencies, is essential for successful biodiversity conservation.



Our Logo

Koru • Silver fern

The *koru* is a traditional Maori symbol of creation and is based on a shape of an unfurling silver fern frond. It is used widely in art and jewellery and symbolises new life, growth, strength and peace. Its circular shape conveys movement and its inward coiling represents a sense of return to the point of origin. It symbolises life that changes yet remains the same. Our koru is filled with some of the special life and treasures of New Zealand, our *taonga* – kiwi, tuatara, weta and kowhai.

Venue



Auckland, New Zealand

Auckland is the largest city in New Zealand. The city of 1.5 million lies in the northern part of the North Island, and is the nation's centre of industry, commerce, tourism, education and the arts. Auckland is the major entry point to New Zealand and is well connected by national and international flights to Australia, the South Pacific, Asia, Europe, and the Americas. The Hauraki Gulf lies to the east and is dotted with some of the most important nature reserves free of introduced predators, while to the west lies the Waitakere Ranges, where efforts are underway to conserve the native forest. The city offers a wide array of accommodation and dining options, and a convenient starting point for further exploration of the country. The conference will be held in the Southern Hemisphere spring, with the chance for attendees to escape the northern winter, enjoy the sunshine, and indulge in the fresh produce for which the country is famous.

ICCB 2011 Steering Committee and local support

The 2011 ICCB in Auckland is a truly collaborative effort, with the 15 members of the local steering committee having representatives from Universities (University of Canterbury, Lincoln University, University of Otago, Victoria University, and University of Auckland), the two main government environmental research agencies (Landcare Research, and National Institute of Water & Atmospheric Research), and the major government agency charged with the management of the nation's biodiversity (New Zealand Department of Conservation). Together with additional volunteers and supporters, such local and broad support will guarantee the success of the ICCB for all participants.


